Denton ISD announces national merit finalist

Denton High Senior Taerim Kim has been named National Merit Finalist. He is among an elite group of about 1,500 finalists throughout the United States who were named finalists in the 2008 National Merit Scholarship Program.

Taerim is the son of Chulhoe and Mikyoung Kim. He is active in the Bronco Band and also plays in the Wind Ensemble. He is treasurer of the German Club, a member of the National Honor Society and drum major in the band. He is on the UIL math and computer science teams.
