Wednesday, April 19, 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

Leaders: Clara Hauth, Marymount University, Arlington, Va.; Catherine Creighton Martin, Fairfax County Public Schools, Va. This session is designed for administrators and mentors of new special education teachers.
