

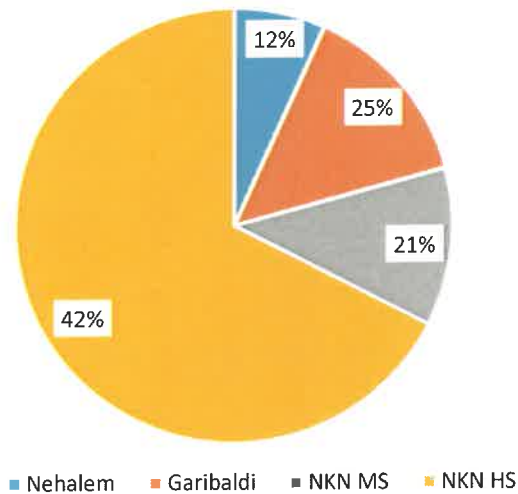


2021-22 McKinney-Vento School Board Update

The McKinney-Vento Act’s Education of Homeless Children and Youth Program ensures that homeless children and youth are provided a free, appropriate public education, despite lack of a fixed place of residence or a supervising parent or guardian. During the 2021-22 school year, the Neah-Kah-Nie School District served a total of 24 students that were eligible under the McKinney-Vento Act. The percentage of the district’s eligible students per school was as follows: NKN HS: 42%, NKN MS: 21%, Garibaldi: 25%, and Nehalem: 12%. Of these students, 54% were doubled up, 42% were unsheltered, and 4% were living in a shelter.

Percentage of the District's McKinney Vento Eligible Students By School



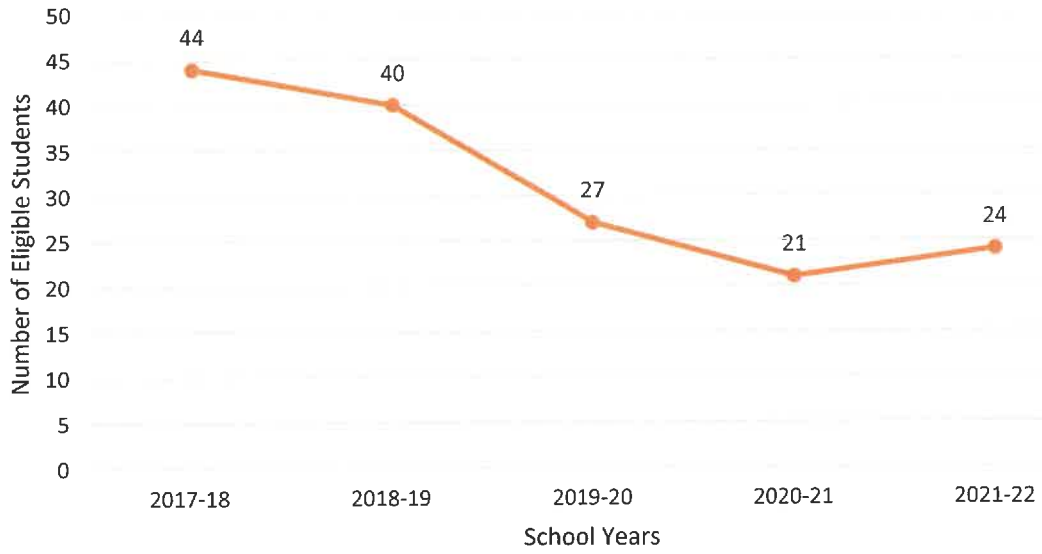
DEFINITIONS

Doubled-up: sharing the housing of others, whether relatives or friends, due to loss of housing, economic hardship, domestic violence or similar reason.

Unsheltered: living in cars, trailers, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings not designed as a regular sleeping accommodation.

Hotel/Motel: temporary commercial accommodations due to loss of housing, economic hardship or similar reason.
