This assessment is crucial as it helps determine whether students are ready to graduate out of the ELD program, ensuring they have the reading, writing, listening and speaking skills needed for success in their academic journey.




Riverside Jr/Sr High School

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
A.C. Houghton Elementary

MCSD Maintenance & Facilities Report - March 2025

Administrators, Head Custodians and Lead Maintenance presented their needs during our budget meetings last week. We will review and decide which projects to move forward with based on safety, extending useful life and efficiencies/cost savings. We will keep in mind the possibility of a successful passing of the 2025 Bond. Through generous grants from the Morrow County Unified Recreation District (MCURD), each high school is receiving much needed improvements this spring and summer. At Heppner Jr Sr High, we are finishing up the replacement of the baseball field perimeter fence that includes an extension of the backstop for the safety of the spectators. We opened the request for proposal process to replace the gym floor at Riverside Jr Sr High School with the project to be completed this summer. We are working with Beynon Sports on estimates for two full sized tennis courts to be built at Irrigon Jr Sr High for their growing program. We thank MCURD for their grant funding, without it, these improvements would not be possible.
