## Mission Statement

The Denton ISD Extended School Day Program's mission is to ensure our students have the opportunity for educational, recreational and enrichment programs. This program provides a supervised environment that promotes safety, responsibility and community involvement. The program's goals are to provide a program that addresses the immediate safety needs of students attending school in Denton ISD by:

- Providing academic and enrichment/recreation programs that will challenge all students who would benefit from extended school day activities
- Providing a flexible program that can fit the needs of our students and those of today's busy parents
- Developing each child's confidence, leadership and achievements through participation in educational and enrichment/recreational activities
- Helping students better relate to others and recognize the differences that make a person unique by working and playing together

We realize that parent's schedules are rarely the same as a school's schedule. We also realize that many students leave school each day and return home to spend hours of unsupervised time in front of the television. In our supervised extended school day program at all elementaries within the Denton ISD, students participate in academic enrichment, recreational activities and homework study/tutoring time.

## Program Growth

The Denton ISD Extended School Day Program began in 2002 with just one school. EP Rayzor was our pilot school with 76 participants. Now, 12 years later, our program has 22 sites (21 elementaries and 1 Pre-K) maintaining about 950 participants. Our staff has grown from 5 instructors to almost 90. We began the program with one director and one program coordinator and we now have one director and three program coordinators. Our sites are divided into three zones which encompasses the 380 corridor, the Lantana area, and central Denton.

The Extended School Day program, with the support of Denton ISD, is looking forward to the opening of our 22<sup>nd</sup> elementary school, Dorothy Adkins Elementary. Adkins Elementary is located in our south corridor of Denton ISD. With our growth, the Adkins program will start out a little smaller but we anticipate high levels of growth in this program very quickly. To start out the 2014-2015 school year, we will have 3 instructors and approximately 60 students. The operational impact of ESD at Adkins Elementary will be the use of the cafeteria, gym, cafeteria office space, and classrooms as needed. This is consistent with the last 4 elementary schools built.

# Curriculum Enhancement Summary

The Extended School Day program is always trying to enhance the environment that our children are learning in. We accomplish this through various techniques. ## Enrollment and Registration

As of April 1, 2014, there are 948 students registered for the Extended School Day Program. At each school, the Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> Grade classes have a maximum enrollment of 16 in order to ensure safety and quality of care. In our larger schools, the Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade classes are separate, with a maximum of 16 in each class. Those schools include Blanton, Cross Oaks, EP Rayzor, Hawk, McNair, Paloma Creek, Pecan Creek, Providence, and Savannah. The remaining 12 elementary schools have a combined Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> Grade class. The 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> grade classes have a maximum enrollment of 22 students. Where the demand is higher and space is available, we have a second 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> grade class that can accommodate up to 15 students. Campuses with a second 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> grade class are Blanton, EP Rayzor, and Hawk. 4<sup>th</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> grade classes at all schools are combined, and they are open to 22 students at each school. In 2011, we opened a Pre-K program at Gonzalez School for Young Children. This program has a maximum capacity of 8 students.

As the Extended School Day program grows, we continually strive to update and refine the registration process. With the continued development of our registration process, we broke the registration process into two parts, beginning in April of 2012. The first part is a pre-registration process that is conducted online where parents secure their child's spot from the comfort and convenience of their own home. If home computer access is not available, the parents can go to any campus to use the computers. The second part is conducted face-to-face at Strickland Middle School. Here, parents submit hard copies of the ESD registration materials. One of the advantages of the online portion of the registration process is not only convenience for families, but that it has eliminated the overnight camping chaos.

## Tuition and Scholarships

There is a one-time fee of \$50 to register each child in the Extended School Day Program. Tuition is \$160 per month, per child. Broken down by week, it comes to about \$43.60 per week or \$8.72 per day. Children that enroll in the middle of the month pay a pro-rated tuition for the number of days they will be attending.

The Extended School Day program does offer assistance through scholarships to families that are experiencing a hardship, medical emergency, or other family crisis. As reflected in this past school year, the majority of scholarship requests come from Title I schools. At our Title I schools, we try to help families by offering them a scholarship (either full or partial), or referring them to Communities in Schools, depending on the type and length of assistance needed. The director reviews the information to determine the scholarship award. For families in need, we can provide payment plans throughout the month.

In the 2014-2015 school year, the one-time registration fee will be \$55.00. Tuition will be \$175 per month. Increases in tuition are necessary for staff salaries, staff training, supply budgets, and the opening of Adkins Elementary.
