**Background:** Pleasantdale SD 107 seeks to provide students with a well rounded educational experience that allows for exploration and discovery. This experience goes well beyond classes that would be considered core classes (math, science, social studies, and ELA). The Board of Education has set the expectation that in addition to the required coursework our schools will offer *in kindergarten through grade 8, language arts, reading, other communication skills, science, mathematics, social studies, art, music, and drug and substance abuse prevention.* (Board Policy 6:60) At the middle school we have several course offerings that enhance the student experience. These courses include art, general music, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), World Language (Spanish), Health, and Physical Education. Course content and grade level offerings vary as you can see in the table below.

**Evolution of World Language:** At the May 15, 2019 Board of Education meeting Assistant Superintendent, Jennifer Ban provided the Board with an update on the evolution of our world language program and the direction of the curriculum review. At that time Dr. Ban discussed the philosophy of our program. The philosophy of the program states:

The District 107 World Language program prepares students to become linguistically competent in another language. This foundation enables the 21st century learner to understand, interact with, and appreciate other cultures in our global community. We believe that:

- Language proficiency is a skill that must be developed over time and is best begun at an early age.
- The critical components of communication are reading, writing, speaking, and listening.
- Knowing multiple languages is the global standard, not the exception.
- Speaking multiple languages is essential to today's learner.
- Students make connections to their own language(s) through studying another language.
- Second language acquisition develops critical thinking skills.
- Authentic practice in the classroom leads to language use beyond the classroom into the community.

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As part of the World Language curriculum review process that will continue next year, the district looks to implement additional language offerings for students. As a small district we look to be fiscally responsible when implementing additional language offerings. As such, the district is giving special consideration to programs that allow students to learn a language in an environment that blends online and traditional learning methods. This approach allows the district to offer high quality programs without meaningfully increasing staffing levels. The focus for the district when considering additional world language offerings is:

- Offer additional languages to provide students more choice.
- Avoid an increase in staff.
- Utilize one-to-one technology capabilities.

An Opportunity for Alternative Experiences: As we look to implement additional World Language offerings into our program we also have an opportunity to offer alternatives to World Language. While the district fully supports students engaging in a World Language study, we also realize that not all students have the background or the desire for such a study. Therefore as the district considers additional World Languages we will also consider alternatives to students taking a World Language class. These alternative courses may include American Sign Language, technology (coding), executive functioning support, or other courses that will support students' growth and development. In order to continue to be fiscally responsible we will use the same focus as stated above:

- Offer additional opportunities (alternatives to World Language) to provide students more choice.
- Avoid an increase in staff.
- Utilize one-to-one technology capabilities.

By investigating additional World Languages and alternatives to World Language we provide students with varied experiences at school and get closer to achieving our mission to create a community of inspired learners.
