Fire Science for the newsletter

This spring, Illinois Valley High School has welcomed a new science course into their curriculum. Thanks to the school's partnership with local non-profit, Southern Oregon Forest Restoration Collaborative (SOFRC), students have the opportunity to learn about fire ecology and career connections that are significant to the Southern Oregon valleys. Students in fire science classes learn about the chemistry of fire, the historical patterns of fire, and the importance of fire on their regional landscapes. By understanding how native tribes, like the Athabaskan people that once resided in the Illinois Valley, students can approach their education about fire from a perspective of respect and appreciation. Fire was used for thousands of years in Southern Oregon to rejuvenate certain plant life, reduce fuel build up in the forest, to protect salmon runs, and to engage in cultural traditions that connected people to the land.

By inviting partners from local agencies and organizations who work professionally with fire and community safety, students get the chance to network, ask questions, and investigate a potential career in fire and forestry related jobs.

Students get the chance to work hands-on with fire in this class and understand how differences in fuel, topography, and weather can affect the behaviors of fire. This engaging approach to fire education is a great way to give students agency and understanding in how they can help make their communities safer and more resilient come the next fire season.

Keep your eyes and ears peeled for educational materials developed by IVHS fire science students later this spring to help you and your community build fire resiliency.

Every Thursday, we have food boxes ready for families to pick up, thanks to the Hidden Valley High School food bank.

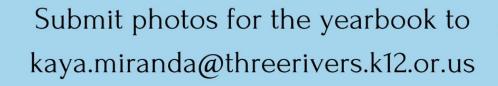

Signs of Drinking Too Much:

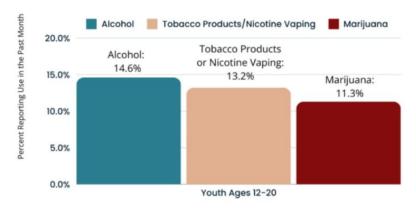
You drink more or longer than you intended.
You try to cut down or stop drinking but are not able to.
You need to drink more than you once did, to get the effect you want.
You continue to drink even though it makes you feel depressed or anxious or adds to another
health problem.
Loved ones or trusted friends have made comments about your drinking.
You spend a lot of time drinking or thinking about alcohol.
You find that drinking interferes with daily activities, family, friends, or work.



Talking with Teens About Alcohol and Other Drugs: 5 Conversation Goals It's never too late to start talking with your teen about the risks of underage drinking and other substance use. As teens get older, they make more decisions on their own, and also face more temptation and peer pressure. Though it may not seem like it, teens really do hear your concerns. It's important you show that you care and continue having conversations with them about the dangers of alcohol and other drugs, and why they shouldn't use them.

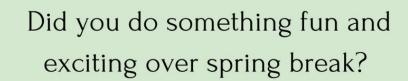
