# Principal & Director Reports December 2010

# **AC. Houghton Elementary**

- The kindergarten-first grade music program was held on December 7. As usual we packed our gymnasium out. Santa visited also and passed out candy canes to the preschoolers.
- The second-and third-grade visit program was held on December 9. The gym again was
  pretty packed and a special theatrical production was presented directed by Mrs.
   Marquardt, our music teacher.
- In our Afterschool Program, we have now added all third-grade students who are at a deficit for passing state benchmarks at this time. This is happening significantly earlier this year due to the state increasing the benchmarks for math at the third-grade level. These math score expectations have been raised by seven points, which is an entire year higher than last year. With such lofty goals to achieve, we felt that it was necessary to make earlier interventions than in past years. Our scores were already ahead, for initial passing percentages in math, than last year, seven percentage points ahead. With these new benchmarks however, we will be lucky if we make 60% passing by the end of the year, an approximate 30 point drop from where we would have been without the benchmark score change.

# **Heppner Elementary School**

It is a once again a privilege to report the recent happenings of Heppner Elementary School. It is hard to believe that November has ended, and that December is already upon us. Our current enrollment is 184 students and our attendance percentage for the year is 96.8%. We will continue to promote the importance of regular attendance to the students and parents of Heppner Elementary School.

The HES Staff and I are pleased to announce that **120** HES Students recently earned Honor Cards and **83** students had perfect attendance for the first quarter. Each student had to maintain positive grades, attendance, behavior, and citizenship to be eligible and received their certificates at an assembly on November 12<sup>th</sup>. Many thanks to the local Heppner businesses who support the Honor Card program, as HES Students are able to receive special rewards from 10 participating local businesses by showing their Honor Cards! The first round of OAKS testing is just wrapping up, and preliminary results indicate another strong showing by HES Students.

There are a couple of important upcoming events for your calendars; The HES Music Students will be presenting our winter concert on Wednesday, December 15<sup>th</sup>, at 6:00pm in the HES Gymnasium. The Heppner Light Parade will be held Thursday, December 16<sup>th</sup>, starting at 6:00pm and Winter break begins December 17<sup>th</sup> with school resuming on January 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2011.

I would like to end this months report by again thanking each of you for your support of Heppner Elementary School, and your commitment to all students of the Morrow County School District.

# **Heppner High School**

- Our open tutorial lists have continued to shrink each week with students taking responsibility for their grades and achievement. Our staff is working tirelessly to clean this up with students reassessing and working on making up assessments/projects that they fail the first time around.
- The district wide Professional Learning Community training with Janelle Keating went extremely well this past Friday. Our staff is working on building some common formative assessments where they can share data to make decisions about future instructional practices. We are very excited about the time that is allocated for such practices and we look forward to the outcomes it will produce.
- ➤ The Methodist church here in Heppner has held the second annual Christmas Is concert on December 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup>. It was well attended and a portion of the proceeds will be donated to both the elementary and high school music programs.
- ➤ State AG Sales in Ontario is on December 11<sup>th</sup> this year. Brett Harrison, Zach Hintz, Devin Robinson, and Kelsi Putman will represent our district and school very well. These four individuals have nearly swept every FFA competition they have entered since the summer. Kudos to their hard work and for Mrs. Dickenson's efforts with her FFA students.
- Mr. Flaherty has a group of students that are participating in local Knowledge Bowl contests throughout the region this year. On December 8<sup>th</sup>, he will take 7 students to Umatilla to compete in the second contest of the year. We did very well at the first contest in Stanfield and we will be hosting an event on January 26<sup>th</sup> where schools will come to HHS and compete. This is a great opportunity for our TAG level students to compete against other schools such as Umatilla, Stanfield, Hermiston, Weston-McEwen, and Echo.
- ➤ We have finished the first round of testing and we are set to push forward from here with a baseline of data we can start with. Below are the results of HHS, District averages which include our scores, and the State averages in all three grade levels of student percentages that meet or exceed-enjoy. Please realize that the math scores in grades 7 and 8 reflect the new cut scores set by the state and sometimes these percentages can be a bit deceiving based on the size of our classes. One or two kids meeting or not can really illustrate highs or lows in the data.

- Our winter sports have started with basketball and wrestling. They are off to a good start with contests starting last weekend.
- John Day and Umatilla will be visiting our school over the next couple of weeks. John Day is looking at a 7-12 configured building and what that looks like as they progress towards consolidation. Umatilla is looking at proficiency in the classroom and will be observing teachers all day and how they can implement more proficiency based practices in their school. These kinds of visits from other schools and staff is confirming to our staff that we are doing great things at HHS.

# **Irrigon Elementary School**

- 1. Response To Intervention: After receiving a district training for administration this August, we have implemented a more formalized RTI team. This team, managed by Ms. Rowe our Title teacher, puts specific attention to students who are having difficulties in learning. The team will make a referral; assign a teacher to make a file review, and then convene a meeting to discuss the interventions this child specifically needs, or other medical or social concerns of the student. We'll put those interventions in with parent involvement and then adjust the instruction for a certain time and then reconvene to see the results of the student. Assessments are used before and after. If the student shows progress, we know the interventions were correct. If the interventions were not successful, other evaluations can be suggested before a recommendation is made for Special Education testing. It has made the process more accurate and specific with a paper trail of the progress.
- 2. **First Quarter Awards Assembly** On our first year's Awards Assembly, the Masonic Lodge of Umatilla purchased for us two bikes to give away to students who did 100% of our AR reading program. The school bought a third bike and we were able to give away three bikes, one to each grade to the lucky students whose names were drawn at random to win the bikes. Again, students at IES are reading lots and lots of books.
- 3. **November First Parent Teacher Conference**: For our first conference we had 91% of parents attend our Student Led Conferences. We had a library Book Fair which raised over \$900 worth of books. Our general attendance was good.
- 4. **First IES Christmas Bazaar** On November 20th, Saturday we had our first IES Bazaar. We sold table space and IES concessions which made about four hundred dollars. This helps go back into the ASB account to support school/ student activities.
- 5. **IES Title Parent Title Night** IES hosted a Parent Title Night on November 30<sup>th</sup>. This evening explained to parents all the federal Title programs that we have at IES.

#### **Irrigon High School**

Last month, I reported that Shanna Backmann's 1<sup>st</sup> place poster for the Morrow County Soil and Water Conservation District would compete at the state level. I am pleased to let you know that she took first place there as well and her poster will now be competing at the national level in January.

Once again, we had a strong turnout at our parent-teacher conferences at the end of the first quarter with a 38% attendance rate. We continue to work to schedule appointments for conferences which everyone seems to appreciate. Since moving to this practice last year, it has

helped to minimize large groups of parents showing up at once and having to wait for a teacher as well as providing parents and teachers a better opportunity to have more in-depth conversation.

Our building wide PLC (professional learning community) groups continue to meet monthly and are really starting to take off. They routinely discuss student learning, teaching strategies, and interventions. They have now started reviewing our first round of OAKS data and will be providing more review and interventions in areas identified as weakness.

We have now completed our first round of OAKS testing. Our PLC groups are pouring over the results and are currently working to analyze our fall round of testing to find both successes and areas that are in need of improvement. Our math group is taking a hard look at how to improve both curriculum and instruction to help our students find better success with the new math cut scores.

After the first round of OAKS testing, the following percentages of students have met or exceeded benchmark.

It is evident from our math scores that the new cut scores have had a dramatic impact, and we will continue to work to help our students meet these higher standards.

#### **Morrow Education Center**

Christmas is almost here and the students are sensing it. We continue to have a steady increase of students and the students are buckling down and doing the work. We are now at three students who have completed their coursework and are looking forward to June when they will receive their diploma. We also have three students who are within just a couple of credits of completing and many more that are close. Our previous report of a higher attendance rate continues and we are encouraged by the focus the students are placing on their studies.

Earlier in the fall we wrote a small grant proposal to US Cellular for a couple of new computer desks to outfit the computer lab with some actual computer desks (instead of make-shift tables) and were granted that request in November. These desks will be used to help with the tables we are currently using as desks and alleviate some of the sore knees we currently have from the students.

As we are now finished with the first round of testing the results were mixed. However, we did see a huge improvement in the Reading category, which we hope to build off of and further enhance our Reading Interventions class and hopefully help the students gain more in their RIT score to the point they are passing the tests. The second round of testing will begin the last week of January and we are looking forward to witnessing more students pass the tests.


