Our current HHS Enrollment is 158 students and our HHS Attendance percentage as of 6/3/15, is 91.4%. Our current HES Enrollment is 180 students and our HES Attendance percentage is 95.0%.

May was full of many exciting events and field trips which took place at HES with the highlights being Tupper Outdoor School in early May for sixth grade students and the combined "Spring Musical Program" which was held on May 14<sup>th</sup>. #### **Field Trips**

Each grade level has had the opportunity to go on an end-of-the-year field trip as a way to extend learning outside of the classroom, as well as celebrate the year coming to a close. The 4<sup>th</sup> grade went to the Maryhill Museum where they experienced an art exhibit and were able to create art using the same media as the exhibit. Fifth graders had the opportunity to go to the Watershed Field Days at the McNary Dam where they conducted science experiments related to water. # Management's Discussion and Analysis

#### Finance

May General Fund collections include the final payment from Basic School Support of \$1,407,899 and an \$117,854 in Small HS Grant funds for the 14/15 year. Prior year adjustments for 13/14 included \$73,693 in State School Funds and \$2,980 from the Small HS Grant. This extra funding increases the estimated Ending Fund Balance to \$5.1mm.

# Maintenance

# **DLR Group**

The District held the final workshop with DLR Group on May 28<sup>th</sup> at Sam Boardman for long term planning. They presented the drafts of future building concepts, but still need to make some changes. They will be presenting to the Board in September.

### **McKinstry**

- 1) MCSD selected "Option 2 Front end DDC integration" as the intended project scope of work, approximate cost of \$400,000. The vendor selected for this project was awarded to Clima-Tech.
- 2) McKinstry has met with Umatilla Electric Cooperative to define the requirements and timeline required to secure incentive money. The utility has assured us that with quick turnaround on the 8 energy assessment reports (one per school), they will be able to secure incentive money. We are working to ensure these reports will meet the requirements of all incentivizing groups.
- 3) Tom Hogstad identified a supplier of the "obsolete" controllers. The plan is to purchase a number of the most critical controllers for MCSD to stock as replacement parts.
- 4) Expected Project Development Plan completion date of 19JUNE2015.
- 5) DDC install to begin June 15th.
- 6) Univentilator repairs at Sam Boardman 75% completed with commissioning to begin this week.
- There were no major maintenance issues to report for the month of May.
- The Ford Focus has been ordered for the district and we are still in process of setting up surplus sale for the vehicles and are continuing to catalog the surplus items from each school. The plan is to surplus in the month of June or August.
