School staff will understand the language and will be able to use it with students when negative behaviors arise. The tools presented can also be used for a social skills curriculum, and could potentially be a year-round class. Ideas for interventions could have a tremendous potential to change students from having a negative outlook on life, to realizing that they have the power to change and create a positive future for themselves. The program is starting to take off all over the country and is being used in schools, juvenile detention centers, jails, probation departments, and in prison systems.
