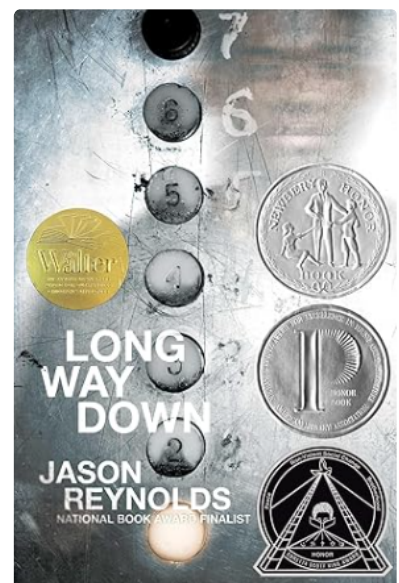
Kathryn Harmon's Book Recommendations in Celebration of Black History Month

! Attention Graduates, FASFA Information !

FAFSA Alert – Take Action to Help Your Student Secure College Funding!

Dear Neah-Kah-Nie Family,

As your student nears the end of their senior year, we want to remind you that the FAFSA application for the upcoming academic year is open! Completing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is an essential step in accessing financial assistance for college, including federal and state grants, loans, and work-study opportunities. These resources can significantly reduce the cost of higher education for your student. However, students who absolutely have no plans to participate in postsecondary education or are joining the military can be exempt from this assignment by emailing Esther at esthert@nknsd.org.

This topic is a focus in your student's advisory class, and we are encouraging them to discuss the process with you at home. Here's how you can get started:

Steps to Complete the FAFSA:

1. Gather Required Documents

1. Tax returns, bank statements, and Social Security numbers (for both the student and parents, if the student is considered dependent).

2. Create an FSA ID

1. Visit studentaid.gov to create a unique username and password for both the student and one parent (if applicable).

3. Access the FAFSA Application

1. Log in at fafsa.gov with your FSA ID to begin the application process.

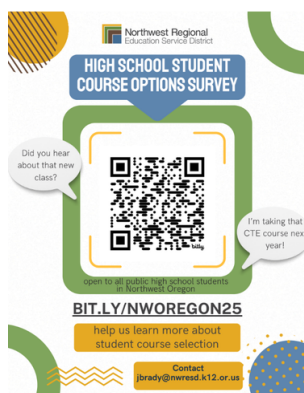

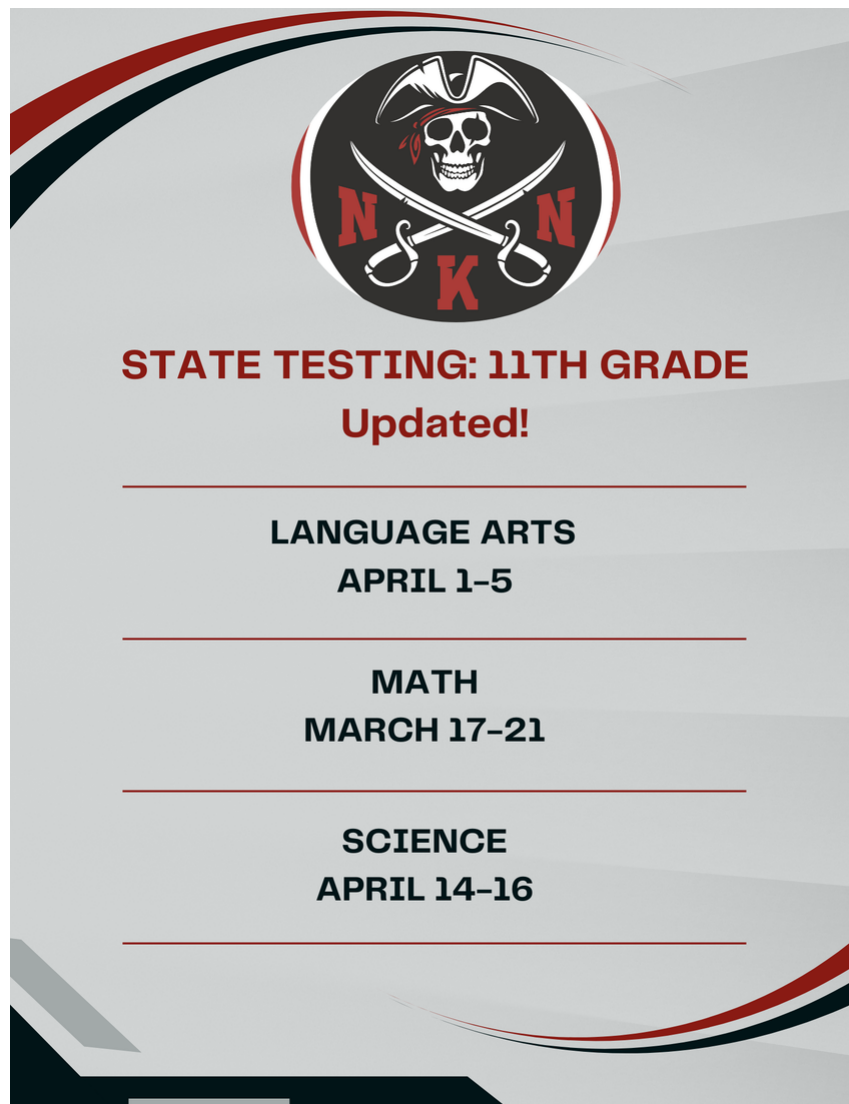

Attention 11th Graders- State Testing Information (Update)!

State testing is coming up in March for all 11th grade students. The state test provides a standardized way to measure student learning and ensure accountability in education. It helps identify gaps in knowledge and skills, allowing teachers to adjust their strategies to better meet students' needs. State tests also give parents and policymakers valuable insights into school and district performance, helping to guide decisions about funding and resources. Ultimately, these assessments aim to ensure that all students have access to a high-quality education and are prepared for future academic and career challenges. Our hope is that all 11th graders do their best on the test this year to show how great the NKN School District is at educating our students!

Forecasting for classes next year-Interested in taking courses at TBCC?

In 2005, the Oregon Legislature enacted Senate Bill 300, the Expanded Options Program (EOP). You are receiving this letter because your high school student may be eligible for this option and might be interested in pursuing **free** courses at the college level. Please read the information in this letter very carefully. Discuss this opportunity with your student, paying particular attention to the requirements. If your student is interested in pursuing this option, your student must complete the Neah-Kah-Nie District Expanded Options Program Student Notice & Assurances Form included in this packet; your student must complete this form and turn it in to Esther Troyer at Neah-Kah-Nie High School by **May 15, 2025**. You may also contact Esther to set up an appointment if you have questions about the steps required to access this unique educational opportunity. Students that

fail to turn in their paperwork by the **May 15 deadline** will be placed on a wait list and priority given to at-risk students.

Senate Bill 300 provides all eligible high school students increased access to a limited pool of credits set aside for coursework at post-secondary sites. All eligible students may apply for EOP, but all eligible students who apply may not be accepted because of space limitations. Enrollment in EOP may be limited because of caps on the total credit hours that will be awarded by the high school. If qualified applications to EOP exceed space limitations, the district will establish a process that gives priority to at-risk students. Students will be able to access the EOP as long as funds last; the EOP will discontinue once the funds are expended. The Neah-Kah-Nie School District recognizes Tillamook Bay Community College as our higher education partner in this effort.

We are proud to have you as our educational partners and look forward to continuing to offer a solid academic program for Neah-Kah-Nie High School students.

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Who is an "Eligible Student"?

An "eligible student" means a student enrolled full time in Neah-Kah-Nie High School and:

- is 16 years or older at the time of enrollment in a course under the EOP;
- is in grade 11 or 12 or has not yet completed the required credits for grade 11 or 12, but the district has allowed the student to participate in the program;
- has developed an individual education plan;
- has not successfully completed the requirements for a high school diploma; and
- is not a foreign exchange student.

What is an "Eligible Post-Secondary Institution"?


- Neah-Kah-Nie High School's post-secondary partner has been identified as Tillamook Bay Community College (TBCC).

What is an "Eligible Postsecondary Course"?

- Any non-associate course or program offered through an eligible post-secondary institution if the course or program may lead to high school completion, a certificate, professional certification, associate degree or baccalaureate degree;
- It includes academic and professional technical courses and distance education courses;
- It does not include a duplicate course, which is defined as a course with a scope that is identical to the scope of another course;
- Any course which is at a 100 level or higher.

What is the purpose of the Expanded Options Program? The purpose of the EOP is to:

- Create a seamless education system for students enrolled in grades 11 and 12 to:
- Have additional options to continue or complete their education;
- Earn concurrent high school and college credits; and
- Gain early entrance into post-secondary education.
- Promote and support existing, accelerated college credit programs, and support the development of new programs that are unique to a community's secondary and post-secondary relationships and resources;
- Allow eligible students who participate in the EOP to enroll full-time or part-time in an eligible post-secondary institution;
- Provide public funding to Tillamook Bay Community College for educational services to eligible students to offset the cost of tuition, fees, textbooks, equipment and materials for students who participate in the EOP;
- To increase the number of at-risk students earning college credits or preparing to enroll in a post-secondary institution.

☐ I understand that I will not be able to take courses for more than two academic years if I am a current sophomore, OR one academic year if I am a current junior.

☐ I understand that the grades that I earn in TBCC classes will be put on my transcript and used to calculate my GPA and my class standing and will be part of my permanent college record. Neah-Kah-Nie High School only transcripts 2 credits or higher, as well as 100 level or higher, only courses at this level will be included in the Expanded Options Program.

☐ I understand that poor academic grades may negatively impact my chances of being accepted by colleges and universities that I may wish to attend.

☐ I agree to complete all size and district requirements for a high school diploma.

☐ I will make satisfactory progress in my TBCC courses in order to continue in the Expanded Options Program. It will be my family and my responsibility to pay for any courses that I do not complete or fail. In addition, if I participate in an extracurricular program at the high school level that is eligible for these activities may be affected by such grades.

☐ I am aware that post-secondary institutions have the right to deny access to Expanded Options Program students.

☐ I will follow all behavior and academic rules and expectations of TBCC.

☐ I understand the district is required to provide priority access to "at-risk" students, should student interest exceed credits available.

☐ I agree to follow all Expanded Options rules and guidelines identified by the state, the district, and my high school.

How are students selected?

- All eligible students may apply for EOP, but all eligible students who apply may not be accepted because of space limitations. Enrollment in EOP may be limited because of caps on the total credit hours that will be awarded by the high school. If qualified applications to EOP exceed space limitations, the district will establish a process that gives priority to at-risk students. Students will be able to access the EOP as long as funds last; the EOP will discontinue once the funds are expended.

Enrollment and Participation

- To be eligible to participate in EOP depends on your student's acceptance by TBCC to take an eligible TBCC course. Your student will not be eligible for state financial aid. As defined by the state, at-risk students will have tuition, fees, and books paid; students not defined as at-risk will have tuition paid. An "at-risk" student is defined as a student on free or reduced lunch. You will be responsible for providing transportation to TBCC.
- Your student is expected to comply with the same behavior and attendance standards if the student was attending Neah-Kah-Nie High School. Failure to successfully complete an eligible post-secondary course or make satisfactory progress in the course may result in no credit received toward graduation, removal from TBCC, disciplinary action or referral to law enforcement. In the event that a student fails a course, it is the student's responsibility to reimburse the school district for tuition and fees paid under the EOP.
- Your student may participate in EOP for no more than two years. After two years, your student is no longer eligible. If your student is in grade 12 when he or she first enrolls, they may participate in no more than the equivalent of one academic year in EOP.
- If your student intends to enroll in a course that is already offered by the Neah-Kah-Nie School District, your student will not be eligible to participate in EOP. A duplicate course is one that is similar in content and scope to another course already offered through the Neah-Kah-Nie School District.
- If you disagree with the district's assessment that a course is a duplicate course as determined by the district, you may appeal the decision under the procedures outlined below.

Contested Decision/Appeal

- An appeals process will be established to review course selection decisions and will be available to students and parents.

Attendance Matters!

A safe average attendance rate is considered 90%. Safe in this context means that our students are at school consistently and can build positive relationships with both peers and adults as they learn to navigate the K-12 system. These relationships are critical in establishing healthy and helpful attendance habits early on.

Our school's average attendance goal is 95%.

Please know that a doctor's note is only required for an extended period of illness. We know that as our student's immune systems adjust to living and working with so many people outside of their family, there will be times when they have to stay home to recover from a cold or flu. Any questions about attendance or illness can be directed to the main office.

Health Room Information

Reasons to keep me home from school and what needs to happen before I can return

What is my symptom?	When should I stay home?	When can I return to school?
Fever	I have had a fever of 100.4°F (38°C) or higher in the last 24 hours.	If I have been fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and I am feeling better.
Vomiting or diarrhea	If I have vomited 1 or more times in the last 24 hours. If I have had 3 loose or watery stools in a day or if I may not make it to the toilet in time.	If I did not vomit in the last 24 hours and I am able to drink liquids and eat food. If I have not had diarrhea in the last 24 hours.
New cough or trouble breathing	If I have a new or persistent cough that interferes with my ability to participate in school activities, difficulty breathing or trouble catching my breath.	Once I am feeling better and my symptoms are improving for at least 24 hours. If my symptoms were due to asthma, please make sure that I have permission to use a rescue inhaler at school.
Rash	If the rash is new and undiagnosed by a health-care provider, is increasing in size, is draining and cannot be completely covered, or if I develop a fever.	If my rash has healed or I have been cleared for return by my health-care provider and any draining rashes are completely covered.
Eye redness and drainage	If I have new and unexplained eye redness without drainage, fever, eye pain, eyelid redness or vision changes.	Once my eye symptoms have gone away or I have been cleared for return by my health-care provider.

If you don't know whether to send your child to school or have specific concerns regarding your child's health, contact your child's health-care provider, a local healthcare provider, or the school nurse.

Medication

All prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medication must be administered at the office by trained personnel.

Medication that you want your child to take during the school day has to be brought to the office in the original container (or we cannot take possession of the medication). Parents must complete the medicine administration form before trained personnel can dispense medication to a child. ALL OTC medications must be handled through the office (this includes cough drops). If you have any questions about medication administration and school, please contact our main office.

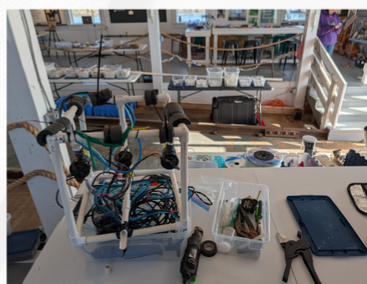
