McKinney Vento Definition of Homelessness: Who is eligible?

- Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence.
- Sharing housing of others due to lack of housing, economic hardship or similar reason.
- Living in motels, hotels, camping grounds due to lack of alternative adequate accommodations.
- Living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Living in a public or private place not designed for or regularly used as living accommodations
- Unaccompanied Youth- youth who meets the definition of homeless and is not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian

Students in Michigan Experiencing Homelessness

2023-2024: Michigan had 35,495 homeless students, an increase from 32,762 in 2022-23 and it is expected that the numbers for the 2024-2025 school year will be reported over preivous years.

How do we identify students experiencing homelessness?

- Provide McKinney Vento Training to all Employees
 - Our teachers, counselors, social workers, cafeteria staff, bus drivers, paraprofessionals often hear first of living situations of our students.
- School staff members assist in filling out the McKinney Vento form and send it to Student Services
- Student Services works with the school officials to provide support to the student immediately
- Social Workers and Counselors work with outside agencies to support the students





Students in Foster Care

The state of Michigan reports approximately 10,000 kids that are entered in the foster care system each year, because birth families can not provide a safe and secure home.

Currently Saginaw Public Schools has 49 foster care students enrolled in our schools.

 Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, contacts the schools and the Student Services Office when placements take place.



Support

- Transportation to and from school from wherever the student is living
- Clothing necessary for the child to attend and participate in school
- Personal hygiene items
- School supplies
- Cap and gown to participate in graduation commencement
- Snacks
- Mattress, bedding, suitcase, blankets, etc.



During the 2024-2025 school year, SPSD secured a grant (2023 MV ARP Homeless II) to support students expericencing homelessness. Items were purchased and distributed to our students.
