The Jim Winner preview event for the new branch was held on December 18. The following passage is an approximation of the comments I made at the event:

> I have often said that the character of a community may be judged by the quality of its library. As we stand here today in the first branch location for Carmel Clay Public Library, we have collectively affirmed again the character of Carmel.





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We have affirmed our shared values for education, literacy, lifelong learning, and coming together as a community. Today we are here to honor one person from our community in particular; someone who had a direct hand in shaping this space we stand in. Joyce Winner loved this community and loved our library system. Joyce was with us when the branch location was just the germ of an idea. Joyce's enthusiasm and excitement for this branch was a powerful signal to me that we were on the right track. The Joyce Winner West Branch says a lot in the name. We at the library will always take the name as a reminder of who we are serving: this community that Joyce so loved. Finally, thank you to Jim Winner for his continued support for the library. This kind of support is what

allows the library to continue to forge ahead and provide excellent experiences to patrons, and to be the library system that is worthy of Carmel.

The staff and family met on December 19 for a preview evening. Preview dates were held on December 23 and December 30 for the Village of West Clay and CCPL Foundation Guild respectively. We received numerous positive comments at all of these preview events. We also received a great deal of media attention and social media chatter, again all very positive. The excitement from the community has been palpable.





Our grand opening was held on Monday, January 6, at 10:00 a.m. All involved felt that it was a successful launch for the branch. The excitement of the community was intense. We are now in the business of running our west branch. We recorded nearly 500 visits in the first hour of operation! The branch has been so heavily used in the first week that we have taken steps to pull some of the Mobile Library materials into the branch to supplement the collection. We will be in a learning mode for the foreseeable future.

Following the first week of operation, it is safe to say the space is a runaway hit. Our first week's main door count was 3,334 and we circulated 3,769 items.

helped us expand our thinking and expectations of what the space could be and ultimately became.



We also have a new Chapter Book display, located near Bob the dog. Patrons are also reportedly loving grabbing books from this




display. In fact, our staff are constantly developing interesting displays
