Basic Information:
This memo outlines the activities that students will engage with in honor of Indigenous Peoples' Day, which takes place on October 13th, 2025.
Background/Historical Context:
Indigenous Peoples' Day is a holiday in the United States that celebrates and honors Indigenous American peoples and commemorates their histories and cultures. It is celebrated across the United States on the second Monday in October, and is an official city and state holiday in various localities.
Previous decisions, actions, or parameters that relate to this topic or issue:
Listed below are instructional activities District 33 students engage in by grade level. Preschool: All Preschool classrooms will be provided a choice of read-aloud books for Library time that include a story about Indigenous Peoples in the U.S. The selection will also include other books about being kind. Being kind is one of our three core Pyramid expectations to teach foundational social and cultural competence. Kindergarten - 5th grade: Kindergarten through 5th-grade classrooms across the district are provided a choice board of activities to utilize with students in their classrooms. The purpose of the choice board is to offer autonomy for teachers in each classroom while still providing consistency in student experience across the district. The choice board includes a variety of options, such as videos serving as an introduction to Indigenous Peoples of the U.S., research articles, and additional educational activities that not only teach students about the history of Indigenous Peoples across the U.S. but also about the importance of community building and cultural celebrations; all supporting the goal of improved social and cultural competence. The resources included are a combination of Discovery Education and NewsELA. Kagan Cooperative Learning Structures will be used in conjunction with these activities to deepen understanding

and improve student oracy skills, which is in alignment with our All In Literacy focus throughout the 25-26 school year.
6th-8th Grade- At the middle school, students in 6th-grade social studies study early human civilizations. During these lessons, students examine the societies that existed before today's society, analyze and explore their cultures, and see how early human civilizations have impacted the world today. Leman will also do a school-wide announcement commemorating Indigenous Peoples’ Day.
