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
We want to express our gratitude to everyone who supported our students and their learning opportunities documented in this report, as it was the work of many who make each and every one of our students' learning experiences possible.

make them bigger?" After the student lead tour and student interview – the students met and created a summary of their impressions in a Celebrates, Wonders and Concerns document that they send to the SISD Board of Education for their consideration.

OT Resident Megan McMaster:

We are excited to share that Hollis School is fortunate to have Megan McMaster, another Indiana Wesleyan University School of Health Science Occupational Therapy Program student on site for to complete her PHD residency.

Here is the personal bio she sent for us:

I'm Megan McMaster. I'm working towards my doctorate in occupational therapy at Indiana Wesleyan University. I will be working on my final residency project at Hollis Schools. My residency project is working on improving student's handwriting and typing skills through addressing the underlying skills such as fine motor strength and coordination, visual motor skills, and sensory integration. I enjoy activities such as hiking, kayaking, reading, and cooking.

Megan has already completed four weeks of her eight-week residency. She has spent that time observing and making connections with the kids while also learning how to operate all of the systems in her tiny camper home. A lifelong and engaging learner and active community member she attended the POW Opioid Task Force peer counseling Community Café as well as joins our high school students' Sunday afternoon Collective Story Telling and steps up to support student involvement in a plethora of other activities. She is supporting and engaging in every aspect of Hollis School to the benefit of all of our staff and students.

Although her focus is fine motor and handwriting Megan is also well versed in self-awareness, self-regulation and social understanding as well as sensory integration to include interception (the eighth sensory system).

Since her arrival Megan has quickly become a Hawk as she is connecting and engaging with and supporting all of our students through there school day! Megan will be vising some of our other district school to coach and share ideas.

In anticipation of her February 15, 2019 PHD Residency Mid-Term review with her advisor our student community utilized our feedback norms that it is specific, helpful and kind when they met on February 14, 2018 to document their Celebrates, Wonders and Ideas to send to her advisor to inform her Mid-Term Evaluation and support her growth as an OT. Their feedback is always so much more in-depth than anything we could have done on our own.

Celebrates:

Student Transportation:

We have been down a bus driver and we cannot than all who have come together to support our efforts to provide safe and seamless student transportation in his absence. Thank you, Principal Nick, for opening doo for access and providing your own vehicle. Thank you, Branson, Alex and Shane, for all you have done to shuttle vehicles and repair vehicles to keep us in operation. And thank you to our Hollis Crew who is stepping up for support unexpected transportation needs as they arise.

School Norms and Culture:

We utilize mediation and a Restorative Justice Model to support upholding our student created norms and our students' social emotional development. Today we had an issue arise that turned into an opportunity to learn what our students know and thing about our culture and norms. Here are some of the things they shared that gave us a great "check-in":

- Our culture is that we are kind. You have to be kind to graduate from Hollis School. (And know how to take acre of and put away your tools.)
- Our norms are that we show respect. What does respect look like?
 - o No touching people without their permission.
 - Don't do anything without that person's permission.
 - Don't say mean things.
- Our norms are that we are kind. What does kind look like?
 - Smiling, shaking hands,
 - o laughing with and not at somebody.
 - have a positive attitude.
 - Don't be rude or mean:
 - Don't put your hands on other people.
 - Don't talk to someone in a way they don't like.
- People are kind. What does kind look like?
- Respect other people. What does respect look like?
 - o Respect other beliefs; make it ok to ask for what they need.
 - No put downs.

We had an afternoon community meeting and celebrated this check in, looked at some data, made some adjustments to support those who may be struggling as they learn to do what is expected and support others and themselves. We are pretty proud of our kiddos and their growth.

Off Line Coding:

We had an amazing February 7, 2019 afternoon of Unplugged Coding with Ellen Hannen. Our students from all grade levels were engaging in critical thinking and small group work activities utilizing only pencil, paper and paper cups. It was amazing. Julie and I both know that when Ellen asks if she can work with our students our answer is always "OF COURSE!" That is why we think we are one of the few schools with a wolf skull we saved from a wolf dissection for our science island and a six-foot-deep pit ready and waiting for a bear to compost!

Classroom Learning Events:

This week we dissected (also known as deconstructed) another holiday and now we have learned that there is another term for what we are doing - holiday deconstruction! From what we can tell Valentine's Day has gone from a pagan festival to a tale of the rise and fall of the roman empire to a time of taxation and civil strife to beheadings to religions seeking power in the middle ages to poets writing of spring bird singing to attract each other to the beginning of the industrial age and the mass production of the valentines card which has led one of the

most commercialized holidays where Americans spend an average of \$161.96 per person for a total \$20.7 billion per year.

So, our goal for this Valentine week was to connect with what we learned from our holiday dissection in a manner that reflects our goal of supporting and respecting each other and our permaculture values.

High School considered what happened over the course of the evolution of Valentines' Day and reflects upon those events while considering current events. During this reflection they reviewed several different quotes from over the past century regarding the idea that "we must always look forward, but we have to understand our history in order to not repeat the mistakes of the past... (there are) too many instances where people continue to pursue wrong courses of action because they do not take the time to think critically about what has happened in the past. (Dallon Christensen). Their critical thinking and supported conclusions were documented in a "Quick Read, Think & Write to explain "What is Right & Who is Right & Why? What supports your Thinking?"

Pre-K and Primary learned about related careers and processes and how mail works in other settings - "Did you know Mailmen have mailbags?"

Elementary through middle school students participated in some creative hands on innovation to support our school wide efforts to help them address the compelling predictions we hear about what the world will expect from them when they graduate. One inspiration came in part from Yuval Noak Harari, "The art of reinvention will be the most critical skill of this century." We had a tower of found objects to serve as a mailbox. Everyone was given one via a drawing. They could not complain about what received and they had to spend 5 silent minutes looking about the object and the displayed random resources to imagine the possibilities while they were also reminded that we don't always get what we want but we do find that sometimes we get what we need. A quiet version of a popular song supported this reflection. After their reflection and planning we have never seen a more motivated and engaged group each conveyed what they needed form adults and proceeded to make some of the most creative and innovative mail boxes we have ever seen - they initiated problem solving sessions with peers to determine how to best assemble, balance or support structures while others utilized pulleys, hinges, and other simple machines to support mail delivery.

All engaged in some creative find motor and handwriting and writing efforts to create environmentally and up-cycled Valentines that allows took as back to a simpler time when people made their own cards and wrote meaningful messages of appreciation for each other - like Phlight Club attendees do. The resulting cards and thoughtful messages are treasured by everyone in our school community.

Training:

Hollis School is excited that we have eleven (11) people (7 staff and 4 students) scheduled to attend the March 7 & 8 Prince of Wales Resiliency Summit. We have been long anticipating this opportunity and we are excited to attend.
