# **AC. Houghton Elementary**

AC Houghton Site Council Guides School Improvement: The AC Houghton Site Council is a group of staff and parents that meet monthly to guide the school improvement process of our school. Our Site Council is composed of five teachers, two classified staff, two parent positions, and the building principal. The representatives above are appointed by their employee groups and/or our parent group leadership. Each year we set goals for academic or other improvements. We look at data from student achievement, data from our twice a year parent survey and other staff input sources. Meetings are held the second Tuesday of every month in our AC Houghton conference room. These are public meetings and parents are welcome. This year's goals are:

- 1. Each student will achieve annual RIT gains for math prescribed by Oregon state grade level standards.
- 2. Each student will achieve annual RIT gains for reading prescribed by Oregon state grade level standards.
- 3. Each student will achieve annual writing gains prescribed by Oregon state grade level standards.
- 4. Sensitize all students to the negative effects of drugs, alcohol, violence, and improve social awareness.
- 5. Individual student's physical condition will improve in the 2009-2010 school year.
- 6. Provide a developmentally appropriate educational experience for all incoming students by properly placing students in an all day pre-K. or kindergarten classroom.

### **Heppner High School**

Both our football and volleyball teams have made it to the state playoffs. Our girls are traveling to St. Maries in Medford and our boys will host a playoff game in two weeks. If the boys defeat Enterprise this Friday- it will be 75 conference games in a row that they have won consecutively-that is 10 years of being undefeated!

We took our senior class to a college fair at Columbia Basin Community College in the Tri-Cities this month. There were over 100 universities and colleges there recruiting and handing out information on their respective institutions.

Our fall drama program is taking shape as our student/actors are working very hard in preparing for It's a Wonderful Life. Their first performance will be on November 30<sup>th</sup>.

Forrest Service Career Camp came and went. It was a wonderful experience for our students to be part of. The grant has come to an end and we are in the process of looking at other opportunities to keep this exciting program alive. The Forrest Service is committed to continuing the program and our commitment as a school district has been much appreciated.

Our Booster Club Auction was successful once again. It is amazing to see how much support the community has for our youth.

Heppner High School and the Heppner Booster Club was awarded another \$9900 through the Needs and Issues grant process for a snack shack down at the football field. We are applying for a land use application with the county and working on all of the logistics to complete this project by the spring of 2010.

We held a staff training with Joe Buglione from the ESD on Illuminate Live. We have some staff starting to use this in the classroom. I will keep you posted on how and what we are doing with it.

Our FFA group came back from the National FFA Convention all jazzed of their experience. I have visited with Mrs. Dickenson about their time back east and made sure I mentioned that they need to give a board presentation on the trip.

Our Outdoor Club took a camping trip to Northern Idaho for a weekend rendezvous spending an entire day of the trip at Silverwood. There were 22 students that attended and they had a great time.

Our Project Graduation project is in the third year. We held our first parent meeting the other night with over 40 parents in attendance. It was exciting to see the enthusiasm from the parents and this project starting to take hold in our community as a "good thing".

HHS' annual Veterans Day Celebration will be on November 12<sup>th</sup>. Veterans will visit classrooms in the morning and the recognition and program will start at 10:30am followed by our students serving them a free lunch.

We will be hosting a Senior Financial Aid/Scholarship night on November 18<sup>th</sup> at 6pm. We have Eastern Oregon University coming to give a clinic on some of the paperwork involved with college admission. Marsha Kemp will also be here to set up individual parent/student meetings on helping parents with their scholarship hunt. Mr. Norton will advise on the GOAL requirement that students have to pass as well.

### **Irrigon Elementary School**

- 1. **OAKS** We've finished our first test of the OAKS and we have set our marker and from there we will improve. This first test shows us what the children have retained from last year. It also shows us where children have the biggest academic need. With this the strands in the OAKS shows us where to focus on specific instruction in Math and Reading with the Oregon standards. The OAKS scores also show us who to replace in our after school program. My goal is to improve scores from last year and to continue to make AYP as a school.
- 2. **Tooth Taxi** Together with ACH we had 25 of our students go to the Tooth Taxi to get free dental work done. These were children who needed serious dental care and it was done in the Tooth Taxi RV right in Irrigon. This saves parents money, children needles pain, and helps keep our attendance rate up with less tooth problems.
- 3. \$3,000 Music Matters Grant- Mrs. Marquart our music teacher won a grant of three thousand dollars to buy more things for our IES music program. She won the grant from the Musak Heart & Soul Foundation from South Carolina. We're excited to have these funds and she is already purchasing music things to enhance our music program at IES.
- 4. **Whitman Mission 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Field Trip** Our first field trip was a success. The fourth grade usually goes on a field trip to the Whitman Mission and it went very well. Six parents went as chaperones. The trip was educational and supportive to history around Eastern Oregon.

#### **ESL Program**

ESL District Plan- All ESL directors had a meeting at ODE to go over the program guide to
adjust the District ELL Plan. I have spent much time going over this plan and it is now in
administrative review, and ESL coordinators review before we move any further.
 Focused Approach ELD- As a district, we are providing more training to all staff who want to
be trained to teach their subject and the language that goes with it. About 25 teachers in our
school district are attending the three day trainings

Congratulations to our boys soccer team! On October 24<sup>th</sup> they travelled to John Day and beat Grant Union by a score 4-0. With this victory, the team was able to secure a third place finish in league and will travel to the Portland area on Tuesday November 10<sup>th</sup> to begin their state bid. This is the first time for them to compete at this level.

#### **CONFERENCES**

In response to parent and faculty feedback, we are changing the way we are holding our conferences this year. A flyer was mailed home to parents asking that they schedule a specific time slot and identify those teachers with whom they would like to meet. Parents were able to schedule up to five teachers at ten minute intervals. The idea behind this approach is to help expedite conferences for everyone and to help avoid a line up in front of different teachers. Conferences will be held in the gymnasium as opposed to the cafeteria to provide more room and privacy during conferences. We continue to offer a meal as well as child care in the cafeteria to help parents. So far, we have scheduled over one hundred parents.

### **GEAR-UP**

As part of our Gear-Up program, we are able to send each grade on a field trip to a different part of the northwest to visit an array of colleges. They will spend Friday November 13<sup>th</sup> touring college campuses, visiting classrooms, and learning what college is all about. Parents have also been invited to attend with their student.

After viewing the play, the actors went back to the classroom with students for follow-up discussions regarding goal setting, the importance of their academic work now, and what they will need to be doing in high school in order to be college-ready.

### **FINANCIAL AID NIGHTS**

We held two financial aid nights last month. The first night we had representatives from both Washington State University Tri-Cities and Blue Mountain Community College while the second night we had a representative from Eastern Oregon University. The college folks provided a lot of useful information on how to apply for admissions, scholarships, and financial aid. On the second evening we had time to get parents on computers to start the financial aid process. Both nights were well attended.
