## **Irrigon High School**

Our goal for the second semester is to reduce the number of failing grades. We spent a portion of the Friday January 26 In-service discussing ideas including Main St and possible incentives.

One of the incentives discussed was a JH movie for less than two referrals and no failing grades. We surprised the students with our first movie last Thurs. Forty-three percent of the middle school students participated. We will expect more next time.

We changed the MS/HS schedule: Moved Advisory period opposite lunchtime. We hope this makes 1<sup>st</sup> period more important as far as getting to school on time. We also specified the activities approved for advisory period: Guided study hall, accelerated reading, silent reading of approved reading material, ICE activities and grade checks. Advisors will check grades with individual students twice monthly. Teachers will update grades every two weeks.

We had two teachers and two aides take Corrective Reading training on Monday Jan 29. We have now restarted JH Corrective Reading with all instructors trained and hopefully on the same page. We also changed the reading program schedule to allow all seventh grade and all eighth grade corrective readers to have the same periods.

I met with a committee from the Booster Club and a private citizen on two new scholarships. Both will be available to this year's seniors.

We just learned that one of our seniors has just received a \$40,000 Scholarship to Pacific University!

Barb Huwe, Chris Davis and I met with UCP representative about help with sports complex lighting. Chris put together a letter on the history of the building of IJSHS that was requested by UCP that we will bring to the SB Mtg. More to follow.

The IJH Wrestling team won the Sportsmanship Award at The Dalles MS Wrestling Tournament Sat Feb 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Teachers and students have been preparing for the State Writing Testing that began this week.

Our Winter Formal is Feb 24th.

We have scheduled the Winter Sports Dessert for March 6<sup>th</sup>.

There seemed to be a real connection between Mr. Creagh and the Riverside students. The greatest result of his visit seems to be that the doors of communication were opened between students and staff.

#### NATIONAL JUNIOR HONOR SOCIETY FUNDRAISERS

The NJHS students, under the direction of Betsy Shane, have been busy raising money this year for a variety of causes. So far they have managed to raise enough money to offer one \$200 scholarship to a graduating senior. ### **ELL Program**

This month has seen lots of action directly after winter vacation was over. My first point of action concerns the AMAO, Annual Measurable Achievement Objectives. After conversing with the district administration, we felt the need to focus on Writing, Writing, and more Writing to get our students ready for the State Writing Assessment test. This launched me out to see specific ELL teachers and school principals to have a direct focus on writing instruction to ELL 4<sup>th</sup>, 7 <sup>th</sup>, and 10<sup>th</sup> graders who will be taking the State Writing Assessment test. This is being done, and our teachers have been teaching everything about writing and doing a very good job. As I have finished observing ELL teachers for the last formal observation for the year, they are teaching writing in a focused way that will be evidenced in our writing report card next year. I guarantee it.

More planning has gone underway for the Family Education Nights. In meeting with B.M.C.C. we have concerted together to create two classes one in Irrigon Elementary and Sam Boardman Elementary. These classes will be for twelve weeks and they will be teaching parents on U.S. Citizenship, ESL, student educational support on Plato and Rosetta Stone, and early child education support. This joint adventure starts the first week of February. This will help our parents become U.S.

voters, help kids in more educational supports and satisfy the federal require for school districts to involve parents.

January concluded the final teacher observations. ELL teachers are teaching very well. I am glad that we hired people who have demonstrated good professional instruction to our ELL kids.

In working with parent groups, I have also been supporting the Parent Teacher Organization in SBE. We have met several times to discuss the school carnival, and how to get more Spanish speaking parents involved. This has brought discussion as to what to do to capture Spanish speaking parents into greater school involvement. I have contacted our ESD, and Yadira Gonzalez and I have discussed to create a Spanish speaking Parent Action Committee in order to get more parent participation in all aspects of our schools. Our first parent meeting will be at SBE on February 26 at SBE. It is combined with Spanish speaking Migrant Education parents and Spanish speaking ELL parents. I'm going to get them in.

A final major work is choosing ELD curriculum across the entire for every grade and for every level. This was State mandated and the State provided a list of acceptable publishers to choose from. Our ELL teachers all went to caravan of publishers in Pendleton, and they all chose two publishers to send for their curriculum to evaluate. We met at Windy River Elementary, and we took half a day to review the samples, discuss, debate, and decide what ELD curriculum we wanted for our programs. The secondary teachers met last Friday at my office and they did the same. By the next ELL site coordinators meeting, the ELL teachers will finalize their decisions on which ELD curriculums to acquire. That will be shared with administration, school board and other stake holders. This will give us a better focused instruction of ELD, and the same structure of curriculum across the district. Thus we expect to have improved teaching to the State ELP Standards, and improved student results.

#### **Morrow Education Center**

The second semester brings with it a renewed focus at Morrow Education Center. Students have really started to focus on completing their current school work in hopes of regaining lost credits before the end of the school year.

We are currently serving 74 enrolled students at MEC, 40 of which are Morrow County students. We continue to receive new student referrals on a daily basis, and we are very busy at Morrow Education Center. The MEC staff is working diligently to provide the best possible educational opportunities for our students. We are also pleased to report that our students have started the state writing assessment testing, and some even seem to be enjoying the challenge that comes along with it. The results of these tests will give us a sturdy assessment to build upon for future testing. We continue to place students in subject matter and provide support for the areas, in which they are deficient.

Overall, the program has been running smoothly and our staff continues to be dedicated towards student-centered achievement. Each day we are blessed to see the learning process take place at MEC. Approaching our student's interests as academic learners and as real people, will continue to assure that we are working towards our goal of serving the students of Morrow Education Center and providing them with a safe and effective learning environment.
