Plan Overview

School Board: 5 year plan - HB 3 now requires school boards to adopt three plans:

- 1) Early childhood literacy proficiency;
- 2) Early Childhood math proficiency; and
- 3) College, career and military readiness

Plan Overview

- District Improvement Plan: 1 year plan driven by the Strategic Plan and Needs Assessment toward instructional strategies
- Campus Improvement Plans: 1 year plan Driven by the District Improvement Plan and Needs Assessment toward instructional strategies

District and campus goals

The percentage of 3rd grade students that score meets grade level or above on STAAR Math will increase from 21% to 60% by June 2030.

The percentage of 8th grade students that score meets grade level or above on STAAR Math will increase from 20% to 60 % by June 2030.

The percentage of 3rd grade students that score meets grade level or above on STAAR Reading will increase from 29% to 62 % by June 2030.

The percentage of 8th grade students that score meets grade level or above on STAAR Reading will increase from 32% to 70 % by June 2030.

The percentage of graduates that meet the criteria for CCMR will increase from 45% to 88% by August 2030.

District/Campus Performance Objectives

Uvalde CISD will ensure the consistent use of a rigorous, standards-aligned curriculum delivered with proven instructional strategies across all classrooms district wide.

Implement High-Quality Instructional Materials (HQIM) use with fidelity (4.2.3)

Communicate a clear vision for high quality and ongoing job embedded coaching for instructional leadership roles at all levels. (5.1.1)



- Do we have clear data checkpoints (quarterly Meets % gains, CCMR milestones, attendance/discipline reports) to evaluate DIP/CIP progress?
- How often are turnaround campuses bringing updates on instruction, staffing, and student supports back to admin council? Monthly? Quarterly?
- Which investments (HQIM, coaching cycles, attendance interventions) are showing a measurable return in student outcomes and which need redesign or reallocation?
- Why did UCISD earn an F?
- What is UCISD doing to remedy this?
