William Beye Elementary

Beye is celebrating its 130th anniversary this year, and is the oldest elementary school in Oak Park.

Gwendolyn Brooks Middle School

Brooks is named for Pulitzer Prize-winning poet and Chicagoan Gwendolyn Brooks, has a library named for influential literary figure Ralph Waldo Emerson, and is home to the BRAVO! fine and performing arts program.

William Hatch Elementary

Hatch is home to the "Hatch Patch" organic garden and a 2006 Golden Apple Award winner.

Oliver Wendell Holmes

Holmes is celebrating Oliver Wendell Holmes' 200th birthday this year, and is proud to be launching a community tutoring and mentoring project with Dominican University and Oak Park River Forest High School that will begin in September 2009.

Washington Irving

Approximately one-third of the home room teachers currently working at Irving were educated in District 97 schools and graduated from Oak Park River Forest High School.

Percy Julian Middle School

In 2004, the Association of Illinois Middle-Level Schools (AIMS) recognized Percy Julian Middle School as an exemplary middle school-naming it a "Demonstration School." Each year, a select number of high-performing schools are chosen to be "Demonstration Schools" and serve as mentors for peer institutions aspiring to implement a middle school philosophy and programs.

Abraham Lincoln

Lincoln is home to an outdoor learning environment that includes a large pond and garden and offers students and teachers a unique setting in which to conduct science experiments, work on art projects or spend time reading.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

Longfellow's award-winning staff organizes a variety of cultural activities in support of its academic curriculum and its efforts to develop the whole child, including arranging an opera performance for the entire student body, seeing the Nutcracker and hearing the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Horace Mann

Mann has earned an Excellence Award for Exemplary Academic Performance on the Illinois Learning Standards from the Illinois State Board of Education in each of the past three years.

John Greenleaf Whittier

The school is named after John Greenleaf Whittier, a prominent literary figure and abolitionist. It is also home to an original volume of "Whittier Poetical Works" published in 1871.
