I know the importance of updated transferable courses and the benefit of articulation agreements to serve students in guidance towards degree completion. I will initiate the sabbatical research meeting with Collin College administrators in which I will collect data and refine the research criteria. I will proceed to conduct meetings with area university and college professors in order to interview, evaluate, and document area college and university photography departments' designs with particular interest in new digital technology in their courses and programs. To conclude the research, I will meet with working fine art and commercial professionals to research the use of new digital technology in the work field. I will then propose detailed plans to implement new digital technology into Collin College photography courses and establish articulation agreements. Sabbatical Research 2015, Elizabeth Mellott Proposal

Photography as an art form and academic discipline is rooted in technology and must continuously grow alongside the metamorphoses of that technology. Historically the process of creating a photograph has changed with each new development, such as roll film, color processing, and now with digital technology. The quandary of new digital technology has brought forth questions of new media, image capture, complexities and simplicities of cameras, and the mixture of traditional photographic processes with new digital processes. I propose a sabbatical that will research the inclusion and extent of new digital technology in photography programs with the goals of implementing new digital technology into Collin College photography courses, creating contemporary methodology in the classroom, establishing university transferable courses, and preparing articulation agreements. The sabbatical research is in alignment with the 2016 Collin College Strategic Plan preparing students for the current photography work force, focusing on Collin core values, nurturing a positive relationship between Collin College and area universities and creating avenues for degree completion. As the photography department's discipline lead, academic coach, photography department advisor and photography professor, I experience the importance of updated transferable courses and the benefit of articulation agreements to serve students in guidance towards degree completion. Collin College Photography students have one of two goals after completing their studies at Collin College: to transfer to a four-year university to obtain a Bachelor's degree in photography, or to begin a career as a photographer. The Collin College Photography Department focuses on both directions with the strategic plan to create curriculum that is both current in all areas of photography and is transferable. Digital technology is changing at a rapid pace and therefore affecting many areas of the photography program, including equipment, software, labs, and methodology. As a professor I attend numerous lectures, symposiums and exhibitions each year with the goal of staying current in the field. Yet, to complete thorough research, it is imperative to meet with area university photography professors to research their designs and approaches to these changes. A sabbatical would allow me the time to conduct a thorough research, and to create updated methodology that will prepare students to transfer to a photography program as a junior. Once a transferable contemporary program is established, I can begin the process to establish articulation agreements with area universities. In 2006, two of my photography colleagues established an articulation agreement with Texas A&M Commerce University, and the following year I established an agreement with Texas Woman's University. With changes not only in digital technology but also the recent changes in the Texas core, both of these established articulation agreements became obsolete. In the Fall of 2014, I began the process to update articulation agreements with both Texas Woman's University and Texas A&M Commerce University, and spoke with the University of Texas at Dallas, the University of Texas at Arlington, and the University of North Texas about creating new articulation agreements, yet I have not been successful in completing agreements due to time constraints. In order to complete the goal to implement new digital technology into Collin College photography courses, create contemporary methodology in the classroom, establish university transferable courses, and prepare articulation agreements, it is imperative to have an allotted amount of time

to dedicate to the research and meetings that are necessary. I will initiate the sabbatical research meeting with Collin College administrators in which I will collect data and refine the research criteria. I will proceed to conduct meetings with area university and college professors in order to interview, evaluate, and document area college and university photography departments' designs with particular interest in new digital technology in their courses and programs. To conclude the research, I will meet with working fine art and commercial professionals to research the use of new digital technology in the work field. I will then propose detailed plans to implement new digital technology into Collin College photography courses and establish articulation agreements. Data collected from the sabbatical research will be used not only for classroom methodology but also for planning program growth across campuses and budget proposals. This sabbatical is designed to ensure the Collin College photography program is not only concurrent with area institutions but is also a leading educational program, serving students with contemporary photography techniques and avenues for degree completion.

Time Line

Month 1: The first month I will schedule meetings with Tom Martin, Kathleen Fenton and Collin College's Articulation and Transfer Office. When meeting with Tom Martin, I will collect enrollment information. When meeting with Mrs. Fenton, I will collect information on completers and discuss transferable courses. When meeting with Collin College's Articulation and Transfer Office, I will collect information pertaining to the protocol used for articulation agreements, collect suggested personnel contacts at each institution, and fine tune the research questionnaire. When creating the questionnaire, I will request input from faculty, Kathleen Fenton, and Dean Cooksey. I will continue throughout the month visiting area universities to research lab spaces and conduct meetings with professors. When viewing photography lab spaces, I will observe digital labs, studios, traditional labs, alternative labs, and equipment. While meeting with professors, I will view student artwork and complete a questionnaire focusing on new digital technology in the courses and photography program as a whole. I will also begin the conversation about transferability of courses and articulation agreements. I will begin meetings with universities in the first month, and I anticipate additional time will be needed throughout the sabbatical to conduct follow up meetings, communicate with university photography professors and the university articulation office, and establish criteria for articulation agreements.

Notes For Each Applicant

Applicant 1:

- This sabbatical project does hit several of the priorities for sabbatical proposals. The project will support important research in how a faculty member's race/ethnicity/gender may affect student perceptions and could lead to the faculty member having difficulties with students in the classroom. In gathering this research and analyzing the data, we can gain at Collin, but also across the spectrum for community colleges, the knowledge of the differences, and how to address these differences so as to aid the faculty member(s) and benefit our students overall. Best practices strategies can be found and training can occur to help all those faced with these challenges. This research can help faculty 9at Collin and outside of Collin) who may have felt isolated to feel more involved in the college and academia as a whole, and expand the conversation regarding these issues to the community colleges.
- This project supports some of the initiatives and mission of the college. In relation to teaching/methodologies, the project will gather the data to help develop research-based strategies that will ultimately aid our faculty and students in the classroom. It may lead to new classroom teaching/learning pedagogies and develop new best practices that foster success in the classroom.
- The project will also allow for Professional Enrichment as the individual is able to conduct research related to teaching, and allow for more networking with others at community colleges in the area.

- This project can also improve the college systems by developing research-based strategies that
 can aid in student completion and having a better understanding of the classroom experiences
 for women of color may also lead to a greater more inclusive dialogue to help all faculty
 understand various problems of student perceptions and strategies for classroom management.
- Applicant's planned research will contribute to the body of work already completed and could serve to enhance awareness of needed improvement in the targeted area
- A very important and understudied topic.
- Faculty has sound research basis for study and methodology. Implications of study will benefit teaching professionals.
- It is a well laid out proposal on a much needed topic that will enhance the quality of teaching in the classroom and bring an awareness to faculty and staff about the complexities of diversity as it relates to teaching and learning.
- The professors project is potentially a significant contribution to the literature on the relationship between race and pedagogy and also will help to devise strategies for better teaching in the classroom. The project is well-conceived and is supported by a substantial bibliography relevant to the issues.
- This proposal appears to address three of the priorities that the College has adopted for us to consider when reviewing proposals. a.) It is clearly Discipline Research as the dynamics involved in the classroom environment are clearly related to the rich social interactions that occur in political discourse. b.) I think it certainly represents Professional Enrichment for the faculty member because the results of the study could provide insight into how to handle difficult situations in the classroom. c.) Finally, the proposal is closely related to Teaching Methodologies as the results could provide insight into the nature of disciplinary issues that may arise in classes taught by women of color. Any insights along these lines should be brought to the attention of the Academic Deans and the Associate Deans of Students as they assist faculty with how best to respond to disciplinary issues in the classroom.

Applicant 2:

• This project would fall under more than one of the priorities for sabbatical proposals. It will aid in Teaching/Methodologies as the individual states that being back on the other side of the learning, as a student, may aid the professor to better understand students, and being in classes he will be able to evaluate possible new methods of teaching as a student, and bring that experience back to Collin. So I do think that the proposal supports the teaching in the classroom. It falls directly under Professional Enrichment of scholarly research and pursuing advanced education related to current Collin position. By expanding on the areas of expertise, and in some ways going into more depth regarding American History, this project can aid the history department in discussing current trends in historical research and enhancing the reputation of the history department and the college through scholarly research and future publications, but it will also directly aid the students by having a professor who is more well-versed in the discipline than previously. As noted in the proposal, the process of going back to the classroom as a student can also allow the professor to be reminded on a very personal level, what it is like to be a student, and he can better relate to his students. The individual will benefit, of course, with a broader understanding of a subject about which he is passionate.

- This project will benefit the college by allowing an excellent faculty member who has served the
 college well for many years to complete course work needed to address the questions the
 SACSCOC team had regarding the professor's credentials. It will enhance the department with a
 professor who is gaining more pertinent knowledge for his discipline, and it may help to develop
 new strategies for the teaching of history as this professor sees again what the classroom is like
 from the other side of the desk.
- Application has support of college for unique situation
- I believe it is in the best interest of Collin College to grant a sabbatical for the faculty to earn the SACS approved credentials.
- This professor is well respected and provides scholarly content to all of his students. This
 sabbatical will enhance the knowledge and quality of his teaching so that more of Collin students
 can benefit from learning history as he continues to delivery it in such an engaging and inspiring
 manner.
- The courses this professor wishes to take at University of Texas at Dallas will contribute to improving their pedagogy and will enrich the learning experience of the students. The candidates proposal is in line with the highest standards of excellence at the college.
- This proposal appears to address two of the priorities the College asked us to consider as we reviewed the proposals. a.) This proposal is clearly related to Professional Enrichment for the faculty member involved. Given the finding that this faculty member's graduate course work was not considered acceptable by SACSCOC to teach History, I feel that this is a particularly good use of the Sabbatical Program to support faculty. The course work that the faculty member is proposing to complete will allow him to unquestioningly demonstrate his qualifications, and it will provide him with new insights to bring into the classroom once he completes the project. b.) This latter statement indicates that the proposal also relates to Discipline Research.

Applicant 3:

- This project seems two-fold. Part of it is to better understand the use of digital technology that can be used in Collin's photography department to enhance teaching and the classroom experience for our students. The second part is to aid our students by developing connections with area colleges and universities in their photography departments and ultimately, to help Collin students to obtain transferability of their Collin photography classes to areas schools to complete bachelor's degrees. Both of these are worthwhile pursuits that can benefit Collin College, and our students.
- I think this proposal falls under several of the priorities. It addresses the Teaching/
- Methodologies initiative as it will be documenting, evaluating and making recommendations for the use of enhanced technology for the photography classes, which may change the pedagogy for those classes. It calls under the area of classroom research on finding new modalities for program delivery. It also falls under Discipline Research as it will relate directly to Collin's

curriculum in the photography department, and with use of new technology, it may aid in course completion. It also falls under Using Technology as the proposal has the individual researching the digital technology and conducting research regarding the application of this technology. This also falls somewhat under Professional Enrichment as this information gathered will aid the professor in his/her current teaching of the discipline.

- Timely and pertinent research
- Valuable for the growth of the program and the success of students
- Faculty has articulated a clear plan on how the proposal will be implemented and how it benefits the college.
- This sabbatical will continue to allow Collin College to be an innovating college with this
 increased knowledge and application of technology. This sabbatical will also benefit our
 partnership with other colleges as our students will be well prepared and knowledgeable about
 the changing industry in this field.
- The professors project is aimed at improving pedagogical techniques through consultation with local colleges and universities to discuss their needs and methodologies. As an outcome, the professor hopes to devise curriculum and resources that will better prepare students for future studies at 4 year institutions. This proposal fits well with Collin's aim of providing excellence for our students.
- This proposal appears to address four of the priorities that the College has established for Sabbatical Leave. a.) It is clearly related to Teaching Methodologies as the applicant will be able to more directly align the curricula at Collin that at area transfer partner schools and community colleges, particularly in relation to the incorporation of digital media. b.) The proposal is aligned with Classroom Research as it should allow the faculty member to begin developing plans for how best to implement the ideas that are identified through classroom activities, assessment practices, etc. c.) The proposal aligns with Discipline Research in the exploration of the digital "angle" being embedded into the College's photography courses. d.) Finally, this proposal aligns with Improving College Systems in that the ultimate goal is to develop updated articulation agreements with our transfer partners for photography students within the region. This should help to facilitate the improvement of program completion and successful student transfer.

Re: Recommendations for Sabbatical Leave for Academic Year 2015-2016

After review of the three applications for Sabbatical Leave for 2015-2016, the Vice President/Provosts are in agreement with the Sabbatical Leave Committee and recommend approval of sabbatical leave in fall semester, 2015, for Dr. Sam Tullock, and in spring semester, 2016, for Professor Millie D. Black and Professor Elizabeth Mellott.

Dr. Sam Tullock has requested sabbatical leave to complete coursework at the University of Texas at Dallas to advance proficiency in History and to complete the necessary graduate hours to fulfill accreditation requirements to teach History. The committee recommended approval on the basis of the potential contribution to personal and professional enrichment for the faculty member, advancement of teaching methodologies, and discipline research.

Professor Millie D. Black has requested sabbatical leave to conduct qualitative research. Her study, "Women of Color in Academe: Exploring Issues of Classroom Authority, Teaching Credibility, and Effective Pedagogy at Community Colleges," builds on previous research studying the impact of race-ethnicity and gender on teaching expectations. The committee recommended approval and identified the potential of the study to contribute to teaching methodologies and the body of work, to improve college systems by developing research-based strategies to assist faculty in classroom management, to support professional enrichment of the faculty member and to share findings through faculty professional development.

Professor Elizabeth Mellott has requested sabbatical leave to research inclusion and extent of new digital technologies in photography programs with the goal of implementing new digital technology in Collin College photography courses, establishing university transferable courses, and preparing articulation agreements. The committee recommended approval on the basis of the proposal addressing several of the identified priorities for sabbatical leave to include new teaching methodologies, discipline research, and improving College systems by updating articulation agreements. It is recommended that the plan for Week 1 be moved to the term just prior to leave.
