HISD employees sub-mitted 2,238 work orders for HVAC problems in August, including 19 emergency requests and 858 urgent requests. The work orders include mul-

The volume of work or-

The volume of work orders was more than 15% higher than the previous year. In August 2024, HISD had 1927 HVAC complaints, including 811 emergency complaints and 194 urgent complaints.

In both years, students began classes on Aug. 12.

Waltrip High School in Houston's Oak Forest neighborhood had the highest number of incidents among any campus in the district, with 42 complaints. Nearly all of the work orders were for "routine" issues, which include requests to repair A/C units or leaks in certain rooms, records show.

Houston ISD hikes property tax rates

Houston ISD raised its 2025 tax rate Wednesday by nearly 3 cents per \$100 of taxable value. The district used what's called "disaster pennies" that under Texas law helps school districts re-cover from disasters with-out voter approval. HISD out voter approval. The tax rate increased The tax rate increased from \$0.8489 per \$100 of taxable value to \$0.8783, allocating the same amount of revenue toward bond debt and a greater amount toward maintenance and operations costs.

costs.

The maintenance and

The maintenance and operations tax rate is now one cent higher than the previous tax year's, from \$0.706 to \$0.706. HISD's Chief of Finance and Business Services Jim Terry said Wednesday that HISD's total new tax rate is lower than other area school districts, including Pasadena, Soring.

The district is facing a

The district is facing a decrease in assessed property value between the 2024 and 2025 tax years, from \$237 billion to \$286 billion, according to the Wednesday presentation. Terry gave an estimated tax bill with average home value, average homestead exemption, average home taxable value and the new tax rate, amounting to a tax rate, amounting to a total tax bill of \$2,217. This total bill is less than last year's tax bill, the presentation showed.

nearly \$9.4 million in costs after Hurricane Beryl in July 2024 and \$6.4 million after a deadly May 2024 storm, for a total of \$15.8 million, according to January board documents

million, according to January board documents.

It may take years for the insurance processes for the May derecho and Beryl to be completed. The claim for Hurricane Harvey in 2017, for example, was finalized in 2024, said HISD's deputy chief of finance and operations Alexis Licata.

In general, Houston ISD is limited in how much it can collect in tax revenue due to state law, and HISD had to commit to granting a 20% exemption of appraised value to property owners for tax year 2025. The Legislature does not allow a school district that adopted a performance of the control of the contro district that adopted a percentage homestead ex-emption for tax year 2022 to reduce that exemption or repeal the exemption until 2027.

Kids' Meals sets goal: Double daily meals for hungry children

By Maliya Ellis

Forget glass facades or gleaming marble. Kids' Meals' new building in Spring Branch welcomes visitors with something far simpler: a giant brown pa-

per bag, the everyday symbol of its mission.

"It's all about nutrition in

a brown bag, in the hands of a hungry child," CEO Beth Harp told the Hous-ton Chronicle.

Beth Harp told the Houston Chronicle.

With the opening of the
50,000-square-foot facility
last month, Kids' Meals
plans to scale up that mission. The goal is to pack
and distribute 26,000
meals each weekday by
2031 — more than double
the nonprofit's current
reach of 10,000 a day. Realizing that goal will require
more funding to buy ingredients and more volunteers
to turn those ingredients into nutritious meals.

With that expected leap
forward in capacity, Kids'
Meals hopes to make a dent
in the Houston area's significant need. Food insecurity in Harris County is triple the national average, according to a Bise Il Inviser; its Paris Il

ple the national average, ac-cording to a Rice University study. The city of Houston

also has the highest child poverty rate of the coun-

try's largest 10 cities, with 31.7% of Houstonians 18 or

3J.7% of Houstonians 18 or younger living below the federal poverty line.

The new ExxonMobil campus – named for the energy giant's §3 million donation – now houses all operations and doubles volunteer capacity, Harp said.

volunteer capacity, Harp said.

It also features an onsite cafe with food that staff and volunteers can purchase, operated by partner non-profit Belong Kitchen and staffed by a dults with in-tellectual disabilities.

Its warehouse space also nearly triples its previous inventory capacity, with

inventory capacity, with space for 22 semi trucks worth of food compared with the previously build-ing's eight trucks' worth. Limited space at the former

location meant Kids' Meals occasionally declined do-nations, including \$45,000

nations, including \$45,000 worth of cheese, said COO John Day. Now, the non-profit's cavernous ware-house means it can accept most donations — includ-

ing more fresh produce

ing more fresh produce—and unlock cost savings by buying in bulk.

"Now we say yes to everything—everything that's healthy." Day said.

The building's layout is designed for efficiency. First, volunteers assemble the brown bags in a large, light-filled room; then the lunches are packed into black coolers and stacked in a refrigerated space next.

in a refrigerated space next door; from there, 23 fulltime van drivers (or "hope providers," in Kids' Meals parlance) load the coolers up and set out on their reg-

ular delivery routes. "We have it down to a

Voucher program to start in February

Contract details how, when state will dole out money for private school, homeschool costs

Texas families interest-ed in school vouchers will be able to apply begin-ning in February, accord-ing to newly obtained documents outlining the rollout of the landmark \$1 billion program

billion program.

The window for families to sign their children up is set to run from Feb. 4 to March 20. Decisions about awarded vouchers will be finalized by May 1, with the money accessi-ble in digital wallets be-

ginning July 1. The timeline, detailed ginning July 1.

The timeline, detailed in contracting documents obtained by Hearst Newspapers via a public records request, is the most specific plan seen so far for the new Texas Education Freedom Accounts program, which will provide state dollars to pay a wide variety of educational expenses, including private school tuition and homeschool costs. Families had previously been told to expect applications to open in "early 2026."

The program is meant to prioritize low-income families and projected to

families and projected to serve around 100,000 stu-dents. Families will be eligible to receive up to \$10,500 for children in private school, up to \$30,000 for children with special needs, or \$2,000 for homeschoolers for the

special needs, or \$2,000 for homeschoolers for the 2026-27 school year. The proposed timeline conflicts with the typical application deadlines for many private schools, with some accepting applications only until the end of 2025 or early 2026. That means many families may need to decide to apply to private school before knowing whether the school will be approved for use with a voucher, or whether they will receive a voucher at all.

Many area schools, like 'The Westview School, a private school for students with autism, are awaiting the release of the final rules for the program by the comptroller before making a decision, which are ing a decision, which are expected by the end of the

month. The documents also show that Odyssey, the New York-based technology firm selected to run the program last week, received a contract worth

\$26 million that runs over the next two years, with an option for the state to renew it for two more

Before the year's end, eligible private schools and vendors can apply to be recipients of the allotted funding, according to the contract. Odyssey expects to open those applipects to open those applications on Dec. 2.

Odyssey, which was founded in 2021 and also runs school choice programs in Louisiana, Georgia, Utah and Iowa, was selected as the vendor from among 11 compa-nies that submitted bids for the lucrative contract

nes mat submittee of the fuerative contract, which is expected to grow alongside the program in coming years. Legislators had budgeted up to 5% of the program's costs for a technology vendor, or up to \$50 million over the first two years.

The contract outlines some penalties that would be imposed if Odyssey does not meet certain performance standards, such as keeping its online platforms running and processing transacting and processing transac-tions quickly.

Voucher program to start in February

Contract details how, when state will dole out money for private school, homeschool costs

Texas families interest-ed in school vouchers will be able to apply begin-ning in February, accord-ing to newly obtained documents outlining the rollout of the landmark \$1 billion program

billion program.

The window for families to sign their children up is set to run from Feb. 4 to March 20. Decisions about awarded vouchers will be finalized by May 1, with the money accessi-ble in digital wallets be-

ginning July 1. The timeline, detailed ginning July 1.

The timeline, detailed in contracting documents obtained by Hearst Newspapers via a public records request, is the most specific plan seen so far for the new Texas Education Freedom Accounts program, which will provide state dollars to pay a wide variety of educational expenses, including private school tuition and homeschool costs. Families had previously been told to expect applications to open in "early 2026."

The program is meant to prioritize low-income families and projected to

families and projected to serve around 100,000 stu-dents. Families will be eligible to receive up to \$10,500 for children in private school, up to \$30,000 for children with special needs, or \$2,000 for homeschoolers for the

special needs, or \$2,000 for homeschoolers for the 2026-27 school year. The proposed timeline conflicts with the typical application deadlines for many private schools, with some accepting applications only until the end of 2025 or early 2026. That means many families may need to decide to apply to private school before knowing whether the school will be approved for use with a voucher, or whether they will receive a voucher at all.

Before the year's end, eligible private schools and vendors can apply to be recipients of the allotted funding, according to the contract. Odyssey expects to open those applipects to open those applications on Dec. 2.

Odyssey, which was founded in 2021 and also runs school choice programs in Louisiana, Georgia, Utah and Iowa, was selected as the vendor from among 11 compa-nies that submitted bids for the lucrative contract

nes mat submittee of the fuerative contract, which is expected to grow alongside the program in coming years. Legislators had budgeted up to 5% of the program's costs for a technology vendor, or up to \$50 million over the first two years.

The contract outlines some penalties that would be imposed if Odyssey does not meet certain performance standards, such as keeping its online platforms running and processing transacting and processing transac-tions quickly.
