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

Historically, we do not know who fired the "shot heard round the world", but NFMS 8th graders use primary sources from the era to come to a conclusion.

Students **critically analyze these primary sources** to **support their claim** with relevant **evidence** and sound **reasoning**.



This is an engaging task that requires students to actively question a source, check the reliability of the author, identify valid and invalid arguments, etc. Speaking, listening, reading, and writing are woven throughout the work.
