We are reinstituting our PE Circuit, which provides life long health like activities for everyone while also supporting all students who benefit from PT and OT goals and services.

© Citizen Science: Citizen science projects that continue include but not limited to Yellow Cedar Trees and Journey North Butterfly migrations, observations and tulip test garden. We are inviting other SISD schools to join us planting the Tulip Test Gardens so we can work together and compare & share observations and data. Primary student have created a new version of their Grinnell Nature Journal and include their service projects. After they finalize their format we will be printing it on water proof paper and they will saw and decorate their 2019-2020 Science Observation Journals. Weekly PE now includes a nature walk with observations while also cleaning litter and checking on the life jackets. Transportation challenges limited our ability to participate in the wolf hair board project this year but we are hoping to resume this commitment in Fall 2020.

Our High School students are completing their 2019-2020 Diverse Independent Vital Exploration (DIVE) applications presented their proposals on Wednesday October 23, 2019 and they are in the midst or making necessary revision to beef it up and or they have launched their projects. It has been exciting to see them take the process to a higher lever – they are independently initiating the conferences and reflections and that is a huge step in their Executive Functioning skill development. This year's projects include passing the driving test, Entrepreneurship and Art, School Business and Fundraising, and Art Exploration.

## Provide sufficient/effective staff support

We have had two great inspections or audits – one from the Health Department and one from the Department of Agriculture focusing on our meal program. Both experiences were very positive with supportive auditors who took the time to explain and train and with their work and input and our reflection and revision we know we can improve in all areas they explored during their visits. They provided some wonderful ideas and suggestions.

We continue reaching out to stakeholders who have expressed interest in serving on our Hollis Community School Vision Team. We are close to finalizing our overall planning schedule and draft vision and mission statements. Next week we anticipate sending a survey, based upon our students' work to stakeholders to help us firm up our vision. In the meantime we have received our twenty copies of <u>Eight Habits of the Heart: Embracing the Values that Build Strong Families and Communities</u> by Clifton Taulbert to allow us to have a common vocabulary as we explore and define the culture and programming we envision for this 21<sup>st</sup>, no, 22<sup>nd</sup> Century Learner School. In addition, we have found <u>Eight Habits of the Heart: For Educators</u> by Clifton Taulbert and are reading this as well. We are looking at a grant to support the planning process. We are excited to craft a planning model that may be used by other small Alaskan communities.

## ▶ Increase visibility to share lifestyle and increase enrollment

On October 23, 2019 we again hosted our Public heath nurse for an amazing afternoon of hand washing (wow we saw some germs) along with an opportunity to learn about the Red Cross pillow case project to support emergency preparedness. It was the perfect visit as October is Fire Protection Month and we already practice Earthquake response as part of the 10.17.19 Great Shake-Out.

Cathy Starkweather, a fixture at Hollis School for as long as all can remember has retired as our cook and janitor. Our students have been discussion that change can bring out all sorts of emotion even when you are happy for someone. We are planning a community celebration to honor her work and our students are putting together a book about how she has been there for and inspired them. We are going to seek input from others in the community to make it a richer celebration and collection of stories.

We are excited to share that on Tuesday October 22, 2019 our high school students began Emergency Trauma Technician (ETT) training. Our three days a week lessons have been challenging but we are proud of their perseverance and they are doing well in their practical response activities.

Hollis students Journey North work is recorded on their website and is updated as a part of the students' observation activities. Other public research includes the wolf hair boards in collaboration with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and the work with Pat Tierney to save the Southeast Alaska Yellow Cedar Trees.

We have had a great Middle School Basketball season and we thank and celebrate our parent drivers and our Coaches Samantha Utter and Naatalgaii Utter so our students have this opportunity to compete in the community.
