

Key Components of MPS Safety & Security



Physical Infrastructure

- Entrance Enhancements
 - Sightlines
 - Mantraps
 - Limited access to front of buildings
- Security Greeting Stations with camera monitors
- Additional and upgraded Cameras
- Updated Door Locking Systems with deadbolts
- Classroom telephones interfaced with PA system
- Radios for direct connection with PD
- Exterior door hardening

Cybersecurity & Technology Infrastructure

- Securly Web Filtering all MPS devices have a cloud-based Internet filter called Securly that blocks access to harmful or potentially dangerous websites.

District Safety & Security Committee

Charge: Responsible for safety and security across the district. The committee plans professional development opportunities and charters new security initiatives for MPS.

Membership: Dr. Cooke, Building Principals, Director of Administrative Services Arthur Sickle, Director of Facilities Bill McMinn, Director of Emergency Management Sam DeBurra, Chief of Police Jack Drumm, representatives from Madison Hose Co. No. 1 and North Madison Volunteer Fire Company

Safety & Security Committees

Tools for Schools

Charge: Tools for Schools (TfS) is a preventative and proactive program developed by the Federal Department of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to monitor and improve the indoor air quality (IAQ) in school buildings.

Membership: Each building team includes the building principal, assistant principal (s), school nurse, at least one teacher, and a custodian.

CIRMA

Charge: CT General Statute 31-40v requires a safety and health committee to promote safety and health in places of employment.

Membership: At least one staff member from each building, a school nurse, a custodian, a member of food service, the Director of Facilities, the Director of HR, the Assistant Superintendent, and additional administrative staff

Building Safety and Security Plans

- Similar plans throughout the district altered by building.
- Revised/Reviewed Annually.
- Required by State of CT reviewed each time a building project is submitted to the state bonding commission.
- Reviewed by:
 - Fire Marshal/Emergency Management Director
 - Chief of Police
 - Principal
 - Public Health Director
 - First Selectperson
 - Medical Services Director
 - Board Chair
 - Superintendent

Safety and Security Plans

Plans address:

- Fire Drills
- Lockdown protocols
- Secure School
- Evacuation protocols
- Shelter in Place protocols
- Reunification locations
- Public Health and Medical Emergencies
- Transportation

Response Protocol Ex: Minor Bus Accident

Step 1: Bus Driver/Company

Step 2: Principal

Step 3: Superintendent

Bus Driver:

- Notify dispatch and/or 911
- Remain with passengers
- Remain on or exit bus based on situation

Bus Company:

- Bus company notifies district of accident and bus information
- Prepare alternative transportation
- Complete accident report

- Notify superintendent
- Gather medical information for student passengers
- Respond to scene
- Assign district staff member(s) to accompany any student requiring medical transport
- Convene crisis team if necessary

- Prepare communications to public
- Notify the Board of Education
- Respond to media inquiries

Safety and Security Drills

Public Act No. 09-131

AN ACT CONCERNING SCHOOL CRISIS RESPONSE DRILLS AND FIRE DRILLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Section 10-231 of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective October 1, 2009*):

(a) Each local and regional board of education shall provide for a fire drill to be held in the schools of such board not later than thirty days after the first day of each school year and at least once each month thereafter, except [that once every three months a crisis response drill may be substituted for a fire drill] as provided in subsection (b) of this section.

(b) Each such board shall substitute a crisis response drill for a fire drill once every three months and shall develop the format of such crisis response drill in consultation with the appropriate local law enforcement agency. A representative of such agency may supervise and participate in any such crisis response drill.

ALICE Training



Alert is your first notification of danger. It is recognizing the signs of danger and receiving information about the danger from others.

Lockdown: If Evacuation is not a safe option, barricade entry points. Prepare to Evacuate or Counter if needed.

Inform: Communicate real time information on shooter location. Use clear and direct language using any communication means possible.

Counter: As a last resort, create noise, movement, distance and distraction to reduce the shooter's ability to shoot accurately.

Evacuate: When safe to do so, run from danger using nontraditional exits if necessary. Rally points should be predetermined.
