Comment: In the definitions, the “l” is missing between the “n” and the “t.” In Chapter 3, there is a missing “of” between “Administration” and Medication.” In (new) Section 8.03.1.1, there is an extra “os” here so that it reads as “proposer” instead of “proper.” In Section 8.04, “Medication” has been spelled as “medical.”

Comment: [Referring to the use of the term “injectable” in the definition of “glucagon”] I would like to point out as a parent of a child who is diabetic that glucagon is not always injectable. We have a nasal inhalant form, where the tip of the bottle is placed in the nose and released (similar to nasal sprays found over the counter for allergies).

Division Response: Comment considered. **Non-substantive changes made to** the definition of “glucagon” (which is section 3.06 in proposed amended rules), as well as to Sections 4.11 and 6.01.5.
