It was obvious in 2011 what the State Charter School Commission would be for. It would have just one role that could not be played - in *political safety* - by any elected official, or even by the appointed State Board of Education, and that was to *nullify a decision* reached after due deliberation by a *local school board*.

Chasing a grant from U.S. Department of Education Secretary Arne Duncan, Gov. Pat Quinn and policymakers in the legislative branch hastily drafted a bill to *deny local control* of education regarding a question of profound impact on a district the school board was *elected to serve*.

Such an act could leave only anonymous fingerprints. It could be done only by an entity unencumbered by any important cooperative relationships. Only by a "loner" organization that could do a job others would find too politically perilous to undertake no matter how powerful their positions in government.

The Commission members seem thoughtful and decent . They surely see their mission - giving "choice" to children whose public schools are failing - as a noble one. Might their decisions adversely affect students in charter-imposed districts who did not attend the charter? The new law *tells them not to care* about that at all.

**Bills to abolish the commission were filed frequently** in recent sessions of the General Assembly. Buyers' remorse. But they were doomed by the veto power of former Gov. Bruce Rauner. That's no longer an impediment, of course. Current Gov. JB Pritzker - a charter supporter - favors eliminating the commission.

Legislation to do that was filed in the House and the Senate this year. Now both bills have crossed the Capitol Rotunda for "second-chamber" consideration. [SB 1226](#) passed the Senate comfortably, [40-11](#) on Thursday. And from the other direction came [HB 2100](#). On a House vote of [72-33](#), it's now in the Senate's custody.

One of those bills is likely to be passed and signed into law. My guess is it's HB 2100, the round number. Its sponsor is Rep. Emanuel Chris Welch, who described Thursday an agreement that has brought all parties to a position of either supporting the bill or being neutral - all except commission member, of course.

Under the agreement, the commission goes away and ISBE decides questions about renewal of charters that already have been established. Charter applications denied by a locally elected school board will be appealed, if at all, in court. There will be no elected school board decisions overturned by appointed state boards.

**The legislators have been cranking out bills** and will continue to do so today, the deadline for bills that do not escape their chamber of origin by the time the House and Senate adjourn. Education bills that were passed and/or assigned to sponsors in the second chamber just on Thursday are listed in the table below.

(By the end, many bill numbers will be followed by a "b" to indicate amendments were adopted in both chambers.) The short titles, therefore, are meaningless. You have to click the bill's number.
