Book Fair



April Staff of the Week Certificates



April was a busy month at Napi Elementary! We spent an entire week for spring break relaxing and recharging our batteries! Returning to school well rested was just the ticket the instructional coaches, staff, and students needed to gear up for the month! Testing took place on April 25th and 26th. All staff took part in the semi-annual CNA survey given by OPI to help guide us in our goals for the next school year. Both coaches participated in Jim Knight's virtual coaching seminar over the course of 2 days and learned a lot of new information centered around instructional coaching and the science of reading. The latest research, strategies, and methods for building relationships and coaching both individuals and small groups was shared and discussed. Mrs. Wagner, along with the principal and 4th grade team leader, attended a Learning and the Brain conference and experienced many new and exciting things related to the brain, the effects of covid, and teaching strategies associated with social and emotional learning. This information will be shared with staff during our Wednesday professional development days. The 4th grade hosted the April Family Literacy night and played bingo with students and parents for book prizes. This event was enjoyed by many! The third and final district writing assessment was completed as well in April and we are showing great progress in our writing growth. Parent Teacher conferences were also held and attended by many. Both coaches met

with Mrs. Rappold to discuss the science reorder with questions regarding quotes for materials. The coaches have a combined total of 4 on-going coaching cycles between them and instructional rounds continue to occur in both grade levels. Mrs. Wagner also continues to provide professional development in mathematics every Monday during grade level prep time.

The sun is shining and students are smiling. In the last month one of the topics of discussion with the students was how the weather can have an effect on their emotions. With the long winter season, it appeared students were feeling over winter. I had explained how our region can often feel depleted of vitamin D during the long winter months as we do not get very much sun. That the sun will soon start shining and the last few months of school will go by really fast because we will start doing so many activities outside and be very busy. Indeed, April has gone by very fast.

During the Month of April, I like to focus on identifying individuality and what makes each person unique. Students have grown so much from Fall until Spring. During the year we talk a lot about positive-self talk and building self-confidence. This month's lessons focused on identifying the positive things that make students unique. They had to trace their hand, cut out the tracing, and write something that makes them stand out from others on each finger. They found this really difficult to do because some students stated they didn't want to brag on themselves and some just found it hard to think of themselves in positive ways. After completing this activity we stapled each handprint to my bulletin board where we created flowers. When reflecting on lessons that we have completed this year it appears that students find it easy to give a compliment to another person but find it challenging to compliment themselves. With that, I would like to create more lessons that focus on giving compliments to themselves.

Spokinaapi continues to support students' social and emotional needs by providing a safe space for them to talk, take 5, and or learn some self-regulation skills. Students also have the option to play in the Spokinaapi office during their lunch recess.

Counselor Center--Mr. Andreas

During the month of April, all students in grades 4 and 5 received social emotional instruction using the Second Step Curriculum on the topic of Problem Solving. Lessons were presented on STEP Process (S-Say the Problem Out Loud, T-Think of Solution, E-Explore Consequences and P-Pick the Best Solution). The Second Step Social Emotional Curriculum is used throughout the school year as part of the specials rotation and students will learn problem solving skills and emotional management and problem solving skills. In addition to the Second Step Instruction, Tier 3 students receive daily Check and Connects at the beginning of each day to make sure their basic needs have been taken care of and they are ready to learn. Additionally, I provide 2 DESSA Dessa Small Groups to further build social emotional skills for 15 students that have been identified by their teacher.

The Napi Counseling Center has also been busy providing supportive services to students who need them to be academically successful. These services include; coats, hats and gloves as needed, access to showers and hygiene products, weekend food program, referrals to IHS Behavioral Health, special services screening/assessment services, home visits and family support, 504 medical plans and accommodations, emergency transportation, conflict mediation and crisis counseling as needed. It is my vision to assist students in eliminating the barriers to academic success so that students can become successful.
