Curriculum

We continue to add elective class syllabi to the curriculum webpage. Entrepreneurship is the newest. We will be offering some amazing new elective classes in the second semester of 2019. Automotive class will be taught down at the maintenance shop in Thorne Bay. Sewing will be added as will Cinematography and SCUBA to the list offered. Professional Development

We will also conduct a needs assessment survey for professional development for FY20.

School Comprehensive Improvement

The Naukati School staff has been working diligently over the holiday break and into the new year on student data analysis, school-wide discipline plans, trainings for staff members, and scheduling changes to improve the academic and climate of our school. We have been assigned a State school improvement coach and she will be arriving for her first visit on January 21st to work with us. We have been in contact with her for the past three weeks and she seems very knowledgeable and ready to jump in and offer her support. The Naukati teachers, Janet Stout and our State coach will all be attending the RTI conference in Anchorage at the end of this month. This conference will give us some good insight on best practices working with students with accommodations and special needs.
