<u>1. Highlighted School Report</u>

Instructional Delivery:

Hopson Middle School is educating students despite the major challenges presented with COVID-19. Teachers are balancing their instruction and activities based on feedback from students, parents, the community and the school district. A mix of paper packets filled with instruction and examples, and Zoom meetings constitute the majority of the instructional delivery while Utqiagvik has been in Red or "Hunker Down". While it would be most beneficial to have more delivery via the internet, many families do not have or are limited in their data access at home. A survey after Q1 indicated that most parents continued to prefer paper packets over the use of internet data on computers that were distributed in September. Teachers made the transition to providing lessons via video clips that were downloaded onto thumb drives and/or accessed via Google Classroom.

One example of an assignment in 7th grade language arts was a project called The Flat Teacher-Bitmoji Agnauraq assignment. This work came about as a way to connect with students and bridge the distance delivery learning gap. An important component of this assignment is the choice board which allows the individual to modify the work based on what they enjoy and find themselves comfortable. Additionally, the Bitmoji Agnauraq assignment was developed to be completed either online, by phone or as part of a paper-pencil packet; this is intended to allow flexibility of assignment creation and submission for students and families. The assignment was developed after seeing several other teachers across the country using the idea of <u>Flat Stanley</u> as a model. Although this assignment was more of a "get-to-know" students type of assignment it fits a variety of standards for ELA as well as other areas (ie. local community culture, social studies and technology). Standards: Reading Standards for Literacy, Integration of Knowledge and Ideas, Standard 7-Integrate visual information (e.g., in charts, graphs, photographs, videos, or maps) with other information in print and digital texts.

Parent teacher conferences were Sept. 29-30. Parents liked the ability to Zoom with teachers. We will continue this option in the future.

Instructional Delivery and Cultural Integration:

During the pandemic, many Hopson students honed their hunting, fishing, gathering, and harvesting skills with their families. We encouraged students to submit something in writing or pictures to tell about their learning for credit.

In addition, teachers collaborate often to develop cross curricular and cultural learning opportunities. Recently our art teacher, Elena Allers and social studies teacher, Robert Faubel developed the following project:

Arctic Armor

The HMS entrance is teeming with life size Inupiat warriors complete with armor and weapons.


This year Art students learned about Inupiat history and ingenuity of the types of armor created and used in the Arctic. Students created a life size realistic Inupiat warrior with armor by tracing and transforming a full size outline of themselves.

In collaboration with their Social Studies class 7th graders deepened their knowledge of history and cultures by completing compare/contrast activities between arctic style armory to the types of armor used in Ancient Greece and Rome. Students learned about the use of form and function in design.

Hopson partnered with the University of Arkansas' International program. Behavioral Support: PBIS and Leadership:

Students were given a "reveal packet" (filled with some fun things in their pack color) revealing their PBIS pack for the year. PBIS Bingo cards were sent home with activities to do to get a bingo for their pack (Sept. 28-Oct. 16). For example students could write the name of someone that has helped them with their work. Prizes were given for those who returned their cards and points were given to their packs.
