### Growing All Learners to Achieve Excellence in CTE

- **CTE Summer PEIMS Reports – TEA Required Documents. Completed and Submitted**
  - Purpose – Used to verify all CTE courses are coded correctly thus ensuring correct funding and ensure accuracy in CCMR reporting.
  - Texas CTE Indicator Auto Coding. Each student will be assigned a code based on courses taken. Each code is assigned to a different level of funding. See code information listed below.
    - Code 4 (Not CTE):** A student who never enrolled or who did not complete any high-school CTE course as defined by 19 TAC Chapter 126 (C), 127 (B) or 130.
    - Code 5 (CTE Participant):** A student completing EITHER: Only one CTE course for any number of credits; OR More than one course for less than two credits where a CTE course is defined by 19 TAC 126 (C), Chapter 127 (B) or 130 (the student does not have to pass or receive credit).
    - Code E (CTE Explorer):** A student completing two or more high school CTE courses for a total of two or more credits defined by 19 TAC Chapter 126 (C), 127 (B) or 130 and not a participant, concentrator or completer (the student does not have to pass or receive credit). \*Code E (CTE Explorer): A student completing enough program of study courses in a regional program of study to be coded a 6 or 7, but completes the school year in a district and geographic region where the regional program is not approved.
    - Code 6 (CTE Concentrator):** A student completing and passing two or more 19 TAC Chapter 126 (C), 127 (B) or 130 CTE courses for a total of at least two credits within the same program of study and not a completer.
    - Code 7 (CTE Completer):** A student completing and passing three or more 19 TAC Chapter 126 (C), 127 (B) or 130 CTE courses for a total of four or more credits within a program of study, including one level three or level four course from within the same program of study.

- **Texas FFA State Senior Prepared Public Speaking and 4H – Ag Policy**
  - In Texas FFA State Competition, Addisyn Horn advanced to final competition in speaking events and placed third overall in the FFA State Senior Division of Prepared Public Speaking.
  - In addition, Addisyn Horn, representing Harrison County 4H placed first in the State Roundup Speaking Contest.
- **Texas FFA Chapter Awards for 2024-2025**
  - Hallsville FFA will be recognized at the FFA State Convention in July as a Gold Ranked National Chapter. Our National Chapter Application is only one of 25 applications advancing to the National level for scoring.
  - The Hallsville ISD National Chapter Application placed 10<sup>th</sup> in the state.
  - Hallsville FFA was named as a Premier Chapter in the Strengthening Agricultural Division. This award is only presented to three FFA chapters in the state. A prerequisite for this award is that the chapter must be a gold chapter as well. In addition, only one award is given for each of the three divisions.
  - Ten HISD FFA members will receive their Lonestar Degree at the state convention. The Lonestar Degree is the highest award in the state and it is awarded to members for their accomplishments and dedication to FFA. Those receiving this recognition are: Kaydee Cotton, Addisyn Horn, Sarah Huggins, Avery Hunt, Corbin Hunt, Kyndal McRae, Daisy Plaschke, Payton Rice, Tucker Soules, Chelsey Steele.
  - Hallsville FFA will be recognized for these accomplishments at the FFA State Convention to be held in July.
