
College Credits: Unity ECCP and SCN Programs

Horizon ACT Prep and Pre ACT Resource

Unity High School is excited to implement a new ACT Prep and Pre ACT resource for students. The program, offered through Horizon Education, will allow students in grades 9-11 to prepare for successful completion of the ACT. The significance of the impact will be tracking student progress and growth over their freshmen and sophomore years as they head

into their junior year. During their junior year, students take the ACT, which is also the Wisconsin state assessment for all high school students. The goal is to see students increase their overall average composite score. Schools that have utilized this resource across the country have seen an average growth of 4-8 points on their composite scores!
