Our goal was to standardize the interactive boards in all schools – PreK-12th grade.

There was a cohort group in the decision-making process for the Newline boards. We invited eight teachers ranging from 3rd - 12th grade for a demonstration. In addition, we had three members of the technology department, one from finance, and one from curriculum. Teachers were given websites to research as well as video links to watch prior to the demonstration. They were asked to bring their MacBook to make sure any lessons saved in other programs such as ActivInspire or Smart Notebook would be compatible with the board. The teachers were very enthusiastic and all asked for one that day since they attended the training.

Newline Features:

- Has only 4 cords to plug in
- No projector or replacement bulbs needed
- Connect via MacBook or wirelessly
- Up to 4 students using the board at once but only 2 colors
- Support system located in the U.S.
- Updates are pushed out over-the-air (OTA)
- Training is free and unlimited-in person, train the trainer, webinars, custom videos, etc.
