Priorities

- 1) Our Good Medicine Program which is a strong counseling program received the Montana (SOARS) Support Outreach for Resiliency of Students grant which is ending on September 2019. With this funding we were able to give additional counseling services to our students K-12. A total of 8 counselors will be out of a job this fall and our students will not get the quality intensive counseling services they so desperately need. We have put in for one grant and almost ready to submit the 2nd one.
- 2) Currently we offer Blackfeet Immersion classes K-4th grade. Each year we add another teacher to this vital program. Last year we added two. This is a cost to our district that we feel is extremely beneficial to our students and wish to continue to expand and revitalize our Blackfeet Language. We will be adding a 4th grade teacher and Pat Armstrong is looping to the 5th grade.
- 3) Our Early Kindergarten development grant will be finished this year. It is imperative that legislature fund this program. We need to be able to claim ANB for our 54 students to keep our three Early K classrooms. Currently we are looking for ways to keeping our program. We have reached out to OPI and are waiting for the upcoming bills in the legislature and for new grants that we may apply for.
