## State and Local Governance

- Texas HB 283, 2005 stipulates that the discipline management program and district improvement plan must provide for prevention of and education concerning unwanted physical or verbal aggression, sexual harassment, and other forms of bullying.
- TEC, Chapter 37 Section 37.001
- DISD Policy FFI (Local) July 2, 2008 Student Welfare, Freedom from Bullying

### Bullying refers to conduct that:

- Adversely affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from the school's educational programs or activities
- As a result of repeated negative actions (intentional aggressive behavior) by one or more students over time, and
- That occurs in a relationship in which there is an imbalance of power.
- Bullying can be physical (hitting, kicking, pushing) or other conduct such as name calling.

- Campus leader

- Establish consequences- practical, logical, reasonable and fair -- consistently enforced and developmentally appropriate
- Parent Communication
- Role Model for all

### Counselor

- Address Bully/Victim issues in Guidance Plan (Anger Management, Friendship Skills; Empathy; Assertiveness; Conflict Resolution
- Consult with Bully Prevention Team, faculty and administration
- Individual counseling as needed for those who bully or who are bullied

### **Teacher Role**

- Classroom Rules/ Student Input
- Teach anger management & conflict resolution skills as a part of classroom management style
- Respond effectively to reports of bullying
- Supervise; Reinforce; Support the Positive
- Model Respect and Courtesy

### All Staff

- Know the school rules and chain of command
- Everyone on campus is a part of the plan
- Report infractions appropriately
- Model respect and courtesy

### Parents

- Know school rules and reporting procedures
- Reinforce Bullying Prevention



Timeline: August 25, 2009 through May 15, 2010









These questions are derived from the comprehensive school safety and drug use survey developed by Choose To Care and administered annually to the DISD secondary student population. Random sampling includes a minimum of 20% of the students in the target grades.

### **EVALUATION DATA number 4: Life Track**

Beginning with the graduating class of 2007, Denton ISD contracted with LifeTrack Services to survey our graduating classes at exit, at 18 months and finally at 3 years after graduation.

Question 5 on the exit survey: Did you ever experience significant harassment from other students?

#### Summary: Perception of student harassment dropped 2.5% from 2007 to 2009

Question 13 on 18 months post-graduation survey for Class of 2007: **How would you rate the school in providing a safe learning environment?** (based on 283 responses from total possible 781=36.2% response rate)

83 % of respondents rated their HS campus as a safe learning environment.1.8% rated their HS campus environment as below average / needs safety improvement

### CONCLUSIONS

Available bully/harassment data from PEIMS, Choose to Care, and Lifetrack indicate that Bully related incidents reported to school officials, or on anonymous student surveys, and graduate responses to mailed surveys all <u>indicate a decrease in bully related incidents and</u> <u>increase in student sense of safety</u>. This is particularly satisfying given the increase in enrollment during this same time period.

However, reports of incidents of bullying behaviors leading to serious consequences including student deaths by suicide are on the rise across the nation. We must continue to be vigilant and step up our training and improve our reporting procedures in order to protect and best serve our students and families.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Continued Intensive Training tailored to District needs
- Review of hierarchy of consequences for consistency, and developmental appropriateness
- Update of Reporting Procedures
- Investigation and tracking of bullying allegations by the campus and district
- Website Updates /Parent Communication
- Unfunded Mandate--Seek funding sources to support curricular and training needs
