This month, Arkansas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired (ASBVI) has been focused on student learning amidst many extracurricular activities. Below are some major points showcasing **ASBVI PRIDE** for the current month:

ASBVI Enrollment: 63 students

Prospect for another student in 3rd grade possibly next week

PreKindergarten-Grade 6 = 31 students Grade 7-Grade 12 = 32 students

Overall attendance rate has improved for the month of February, as the numbers of illnesses have diminished.

Highlights and Activities

- 1. Preparations for Upcoming Summative Assessments beginning next month: As the school year has progressed, students and staff have been dedicated to preparing for upcoming ATLAS summative assessments to begin in mid April and continuing into May. These assessments are critical in measuring student growth and academic achievement. Teachers have been implementing review sessions, practice tests, and targeted instruction to ensure students feel confident and prepared. Additionally, students have been working hard to complete assignments and projects as they close out the third quarter on a strong note.
- 2. ASBVI Black History Month Celebration: ASBVI organized a Black History Month celebration on Wednesday, February 26 @ 1:30pm. Dr. John McAllister was the special guest speaker and provided the ASBVI community with highlights of his successes and challenges as a black American and stressed the importance of



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unity through diversity. Several students and class groups added to the celebration by delivering songs, poems, and stories that embraced the contributions of black Americans in the history of our country. This event would not have been possible without the organization and coordination of several staff members, especially Mrs. Barbara Cole, Mrs. Alicia Reddick, Mr. Tyler Pfeffer, classroom teachers and paraprofessionals assisting students with presenting, and our special student master of ceremonies, Lucas Harris. Thanks to everyone for making this event special.

- 3. Little Rock Founders Lion's Club Presentation: Mrs. Walsh and I were invited to present informational updates to the Little Rock Founders Lion's Club at their lunch meeting on Wednesday, February 26. The group were provided updates on the progress of the school over the past year as well as the plans for coordination between ASD and ASBVI and the joint building project. Mrs. Walsh and I were happy to be able to share our story with these important partners.
- 4. Dental Hygiene Awareness: In an effort to promote good oral health habits, the elementary students received a special visit from a local dentist. The dentist provided an engaging presentation about the importance of brushing, flossing, and regular dental checkups. The main draw for the students was the giant tooth mascot that accompanied the dentist, which added fun and excitement to the learning experience. Students had the opportunity to ask questions and interact with the dentist.
- 5. Read Across America Week (March 3-7): Read Across America Week is a nationally recognized celebration which promotes literacy by encouraging students to develop a lifelong love of reading. Throughout the week, students participated in various activities such as themed dress-up days, guest read-aloud sessions, and classroom reading challenges. Teachers and staff emphasized the joy of reading by incorporating special storytimes and encouraging students to explore different genres and authors. The week's events helped reinforce the importance of literacy in all aspects of learning.



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

ASBVI is working with ASD to coordinate the master schedule for the upcoming year. As such, the team is finding ways to consolidate classes and share staff when it makes sense to do so. Our instructional leaders have been so flexible and innovative in their thinking, which will only serve to provide a strong program for our students.

We are proud to welcome Mr. Lamar Raper as our new Director of Transportation as well as Ms. Deana Shields as our new Registered Nurse Supervisor. Both leaders



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have had experience working with our students, staff, and families in previous positions, and we are excited to have them in these leadership roles.

Building Project Updates

On March 13, ASBVI and ASD held its official "Demolition Day" event, which included remarks from Governor Sanders, Secretary Oliva, as well as legislators and dignitaries. The event marked a milestone in the months-long process to establish new facilities for ASBVI and ASD students and staff. Students and staff were present to watch the demolition of the ASD Warfield building, which is being razed to provide space for the new building. We are very excited about the plans for the new building and watching it come along, with an expected completion date of November 2026, and an anticipated move-in date of January 2027.

The architects are also finalizing the plans for specialty spaces including the cafeteria/food services, culinary arts, and the media center. Those stakeholder meetings are taking place in the next few weeks.
