What is Career and Technical

Career Technical Education (CTE) provides students of all ages with the academic and technical skills, knowledge and training necessary to succeed in future careers and to become lifelong learners. In total, about 12.5 million high school and college students are enrolled in CTE across the nation.

What's Going on in Class?

Three Business Education classes are being offered on the North Slope this year. The classes are Personal Finance, Introduction to Business and Small Business Enterprises.

All courses began with a Learning Styles Inventory. We all learn in different ways. Some students are Visual learners, some are Auditory learners and some students are Kinesthetic learners. Although we all use the three styles to learn we usually rely on one more than the others. The purpose of the learning styles inventory is twofold. First it helps me out to differentiate concepts for students, particularly when working with them one on one. The second reason is to let the students know what their learning style is and how-to best study. Now let's talk about some of the classes individually.

Personal Finance-Personal Finance is being offered in 3 of the villages and BHS. The villages are Point Hope, Wainwright, and Nuiqsut. Gerard Butler leads the class in PHO, Randy Reicher in NUI and Randy Reicher in AIN. There have been some challenges in AIN with class continuity due to teacher turn-over. All of the villages participated in the Stock Market Game last semester. A real-world (with play money of course-\$10,000 to start). Students learn about the NYSE and NASDAX stock markets. Teams start with \$10,000 and then research companies to buy and sell their stock. The culminating project for Barrow High School will be a budgeting project. Students will have to research a career, determine an entry level job with entry level pay, determine where they want to live and then create a budget and determine how much they will owe in taxes.

Introduction to Business-Introduction to Business goes into all aspects of commerce. So far this year we have learned about the history of business of business, types of business formation and the business environment. Wainwright has one student this semester. He is currently working on a project comparing how Inupiat Business evolved compared to what was discussed in class. Last semester the Intro to Business class in Barrow High School was put into teams of 4 or 5. Each team created a business model for an actual company to be run here in Barrow. Subsistance Diner was created. A business plan to rent space from an actual restaurant on the days they are closed offered an authentic Inupiat experience. One team created a Top of World Gym. A 24 hours/7 days a week gym. The Subsistance Assistance Squad created a company to sell all the tools needed to live on the tundra. In addition, they had a service-(continued)

Company that performed rescue operations on the tundra.

Small Business Enterprises-You may think of this class as Entrepreneurship.

Small Business Enterprises is a logical extension of Introduction to Business. Last semester's class actually completed the project I usually reserve for SBE. There are 5 students in the SBE class this semester at BHS. Students will go deeper into the all the functions necessary to run a business. In addition to that students explore the behaviors and traits of successful entrepreneurs. Innovation is the topic we are currently on. The students will then look at current business operations on the North Slope and try to come up with an innovative idea to make process, product, or cost reduction.
