Beaver Acres has been working with the above mentioned community partners in an effort to promote and build an even stronger sense of community among all parties. We have a particular interest in meeting the needs of our historically underrepresented students (students of poverty, color, English Language Learners, and students with special needs). We strive to meet the needs of students and their families to provide equitable access to academic supports, enrichment programs, technology, and community resources. This work has been in place since the beginning of the 2016-17 school year and only continues to grow in scope and strength.

Summary of Progress: *What strides have been made toward the goal(s) above? Evolution? New Projects? New partnerships made along the way?*

Update: We had a very successful STEM Future Ready Community Night in late February. This night highlighted our working relationships with the Washington County Sherriff's Community Liaison for Internet Safety, Washington County Libraries Systems and Comcast providing resources to educate and enroll members of our community into the low cost Internet Essentials Program.

New Partnership? We have recently been in touch with a possible business partner who is interested in providing direct assistance to families in need of essential items/services. We are meeting with this business leader at the end of the week with our Social Support Liaison, and Lisa Mentasana, Homeless Program Specialist to discuss how we may best partner together to support our families. We're looking forward to new possibilities and exploring options together and seeing what can grow from there.

Goal: The weather made the Running Club partnership a challenge this winter and early Spring, but our dedicated group of volunteers from NIKE did a great job nonetheless. Having a track at Beaver Acres would be such a wonderful community resource and allow for more year-round fitness opportunities. However, we do not YET have the funding to spearhead a project of this size (or a project manager that can work with THPRD and district personnel to bring the plans to fruition). Team Goals for the 2016-2017 school year:

We are continually growing our network of community partners to support our efforts in meeting the changing needs of our students and families. Our next steps include support with recruiting and retaining community partners for our classroom teachers or grade level teams supporting STEM instruction. We hope to create a vertical progression of learning experiences which can be supported by one or two community partners with STEM industry experience in the area of life science.

Additionally, we aspire to capitalize on the expertise of one of our classroom teachers who has become quite masterful at effective organizational strategies for community partners. Supporting over 10 volunteers weekly, classroom volunteers from our local community serve as buddy readers for students needing individualized time with text during the school day. We are brainstorming ways of capturing and sharing the systems she has in place for replication in other classrooms and/or grade levels.

Summary of Progress:

On Friday, April 21st, we honored our volunteers and community partners during our Volunteer Appreciation event. Students performed songs and poems, presented handmade cards and gifts to approximately 40 of our Chehalem volunteers. Those with over 80 volunteer hours during the 2016-17 school year received personalized all-star trophies. Everyone enjoyed a treat of sweet and salty snack mix. The event was enjoyed by all in attendance!

Our STEM focus offers opportunities to make connections between classroom learning and authentic applications of STEM within our local community. Currently, every grade level has one or more NGSS-aligned units supported by the expertise of STEM industry partners. We aspire to grow our STEM partnerships at all grade levels. Beate Pryor, our STEM TOSA, facilitates initial contact and oversees much of this work in cooperation with our school-based STEM committee and Professional Learning Community.

Through a partnership with Scott Brennan of State Farm Insurance and Bruce Buffington of NW Bicycle Safety Council, we were able to give away two bicycles and matching helmets to two of our students. Two more bikes with helmets will be given away on the last day of school. This incentive serves as a reinforcer for positive school behavior expectations (Be Safe, Respectful, and Responsible).

Looking ahead, we will be hosting the Chehalem Career Fair on Friday, May 12th. Nearly 30 community partners will share their jobs with our students in grades K-5. This supports alignment to College and Career readiness and comes on the heels of our fifth grade campus trip to Oregon State University. We will provide lunch for all presenters as a small token of our appreciation of their time and expertise.

Team Goals for the 2016-2017 school year:

Our Community Partnership goals align with our school goals: to increase reading achievement for all students, and to support students in need with resources they need to be successful in reading. We know that for students to succeed, they need to be well cared for, safe, and nourished. Our community partners helped us work toward these goals.

Summary of Progress:

Our PTO donated \$2500 toward books for every family in our school community so that each child and family could participate in One Book One School this spring. We read *Who is George Lucas?*, an informative text that spans grade level interests as well as encouraging nonfiction reading. Our culminating activity for One Book One School was in partnership with the Beaverton City Library who provided us a space for a Literacy Night with various stations and activities for students and families. The library had new library cards ready for pick up during the event. Along the way, our partner, the Rotary Club, sponsored book vouchers so that some of our neediest students could purchase a book of their choosing during our Scholastic Book Fair. Our students would not have been able to participate without the gift from the Rotary Club.

PlayFitFun is an active partner in supporting our students with physically, socially, and emotionally healthy activities for students after school. This once-a-week opportunity provides students with another way to connect with each other and to feel part of the school community. We know that physical health contributes to academic growth.

A second goal and dream that we share with our Community Partner, the Transforming Life Church, is to support our families with enough food and resources when finances are strained. The Transforming Life Church (TLC) provided emergency non-perishable food items as well as fresh produce this year. They also purchased gifts for some of our students during the holidays. They will create food and supply boxes for our neediest families to access through the summer.

- Equity: How can we improve communication to all of our JW families including those whose first language is not English.
- Collaboration: Our goal is to provide channels for our students to give back to the community by engaging in worthwhile service projects.

-Excellence & Innovation: We are striving to use community partnerships to enhance the school curriculum by providing opportunities that are made available by companies, nonprofits and community members.

Summary of Progress:

-We are very pleased to have recently partnered with Laurel Parc Retirement and Senior Assisted Living Center at Bethany Village. Every Wednesday, five senior volunteers read to children at Jacob Wismer. Our intervention teacher provided training prior to matching the senior volunteers with students.

-We had two performances this year by Do Jump! and Rainbow Dance Theater, both art companies who are represented by Young Audiences of Oregon and SW Washington.

-Mad Science classes were integrated in our STEAM Family Night on April 13, 2017.

The classes included Slime Time, Earthworks, Magnetic Magic and Watts Up. Jacob Wismer teachers taught the remaining 14 STEAM classes.

-This summer, we are partnering with Josh Carter, the lead pastor from Remedy City Church to do out landscaping projects around the school building including maintenance of our fourth grade garden.

-Our “translator tree” continues to reach many parents who do not speak English. The translator tree was established by the principal to seek out bilingual parents to translate newsletters and School Messenger emails to non-English speaking families.

Since Spring Break, we have enrolled several students whose families require translator services and have included them in the Translator Tree.

-Our Nike/Marathon Kids Running Club began on Nov. 2, 2016 with 100 K-5 students participating on Wednesdays from 7:45-8:20am. The Running Club is facilitated by our two PE teachers with assistance from parent volunteers. Two students have already completed the equivalent of a marathon.

-The Oregon Humane Society made presentations in all of our second grade classrooms this year.

-Fourth grade students received a grant from OSU and the US Forest Service and were able to go on a field trip to Fort Clatsop in October.

-Fifth grade students completed the curriculum for Junior Achievements Biz Town and went on a full-day field trip to in the fall. The fifth grade also went to NWRESA's Outdoor School in April.

-Students collected donations for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society in honor of a former JW students as well as a JW teacher who is recovering from a bone marrow transplant to fight leukemia.

-JW's Before-School Technology Club which started last year with parent volunteers is continuing this year. Classes have filled up quickly and have waiting lists. The Tech Club now has their own website so parents can find out about registration and classes that are offered.

-The Boy Scout project this year is to collect our staff cans and bottles twice a month. They can keep all of the money that they receive from the deposits. The Boy Scouts have also held a playground clean-up day after the snow and ice storms.

-We are continuing to work with Lynne Mutrie, Safe Routes to School Coordinator, when we have transportation concerns in our neighborhood. We are also participating in the upcoming Walk & Bike to School Day.

- Literacy Quilts-**Oregon quilters** will continue to support children in our school as families grow with new babies by providing new baby gifts with books and tummy time quilts.

Our goal is for all students to increase student achievement in reading by at least one year. For students living in poverty, with a home language other than English or who have qualified for special education services will make 1.5 years growth in reading.

Volunteers have read more than 1500 books to children.

- They JOYFULLY share books so that students learn to LOVE reading.
- Because of the LOVE students have developed for some authors, teachers have implemented book clubs to continue this joyful experience at home. **Elephant and Piggie** Book Clubs are a favorite.

Volunteers have welcomed new babies with beautiful quilts and books for our students to read to new siblings.

- As our students welcome to family members, they are given a quilt and book. Bilingual board books have been appreciated by families working to promote home-language literacy in addition to English literacy skills. The Arabic version of *Brown Bear, Brown Bear* has been a hit for several families!

The Planting Seeds Team has met basic needs of 26 children and their families so that children are more likely to come school on Mondays ready to learn.

- 10 backpacks are sent home every Friday with food to feed 26 children and their families over the weekend.
- All 26 children and their families were supplied with food for all ten days of spring break.
- This cadre of dedicated volunteers spread the word, and the seeds began to sprout and branch out beyond the school building. Holy Trinity Church's community outreach program, which supports food backpack programs with nine other schools, connected Sexton Mountain with St. Cecilia Church, which agreed to help Planting Seeds. Pacific Foods committed to supply healthy vegetarian soups and shelf-stable milk.

The Beaverton City Library has continued to serve as a strong community partner.

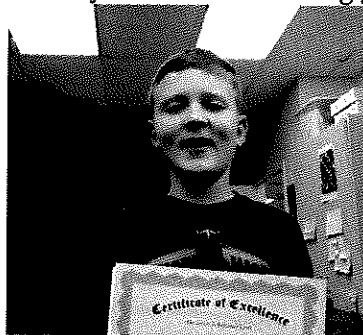
- The Beaverton City Library has increased communication to teachers regarding services.
- Our CPT liaison has collaborated with our school's librarian to share information with students.
- More than 40 incoming kindergarten students along with their families attended Pre-Kindergarten Literacy Night where the library provided information about early literacy development and gifted each family with a book.
- More than 60 people plan to attend the May 11 Family Literacy Night with an Arabic focus. Food for this special event will be provided by Ziggurat Mediterranean Deli & Catering with special consideration for dietary needs of participants.
- Our June 1, Summer Reading Kick Off event at the Beaverton City library with an emphasize resources available for our multilingual students.

Through Literacy Outreach, volunteers have found favorite book titles for low prices at Goodwill Stores. Other volunteers have leveled the books and created themed Book Ladders so that children can quickly build vocabulary as they read increasingly difficult texts on topics of high interest.

- Hundreds of high interest non-fiction titles have been added to classroom libraries
- Book Ladder kits have been built for high interest topics including sharks, snakes, spiders, horses, cars, dinosaurs, cats, dogs, butterflies, bats and baseball.
- ISB volunteers filled 7 tables with books for students to take home in order to build home libraries as well.

As of May 1, 2017 we have much to celebrate!

- 46 increased their reading achievement by 1.6-1.99 years or more
- 87 students have increased their reading achievement by 2+ years or more
- We are celebrating individuals as they reach their reading goals!
