Parent-teacher conferences for the 1st trimester for the high school will be on October 8, 2009. Parents will be able to meet individually with teachers to discuss their student's progress. All conferences will be held in the commons area of the high school.

It is especially important that the parents of students who are struggling with progress grades of D's or F's come to talk with teachers. Progress reports will be mailed home on the 2nd of October, so all parents should know where students stand. This is a most critical time to brainstorm some strategies for getting the grades up before the end of the trimester and transcription of final grades.

Students whose parents come to conferences will get extra credit points in class.

Parents who attend conferences will have their name placed in a drawing for a \$50 gas card.

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Marching Cougar uniforms!! The Cougar Marching Band will be purchasing new uniforms for the first time in many years, and we need the community's help. Several students worked very hard over the summer to raise money towards the outfits and we have received some donations and help from the school, but in order to assure that each student receives a complete uniform, more donations are needed. Problem Solving Behavior Intervention

This year we are implementing a Student Problem Solving Intervention to assist in teaching students to monitor their own behavior. For minor inappropriate behaviors, students will be asked to complete a Student Problem Solving (SPS) sheet as a first step instead of being issued a referral or being sent to the office. Referrals will continue to be used for recurring inappropriate behaviors, minor behavior issues that require administrative intervention and major infractions.

By filling out the SPS, students are able to explain the problem, their behavior, and how they can solve the problem in a reasonable and respectful manner. The SPS enables the student to voice their perspective, understand the problem, and learn proactive ways to deal with a situation while remaining in the classroom.

Completed SPS sheets will be sent to the office and the situation will be discussed with the student. A copy will be sent home so parents can also discuss the problem with their kids.

Public Law 105.17 known as IDEA (Individualized Disability Education Act) requires that school districts provide a free and appropriate education to all disabled children/young adults ages 0 -🖈 21.Three Rivers School District requests the identification of any disabled children/young adults ☆ who are not enrolled or currently being served by the district schools.

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A QUICK REMINDER ABOUT DRESS CODE

School is a place of work—both for the staff and the students. It is important that both staff and students dress appropriately for work—showing respect for themselves and respect for others. Our dress code does not seek to judge clothing tastes by individual students and their families. Its purpose is to define what is appropriate for the work of teaching and learning. We sincerely encourage students to express themselves and their personalities in their clothing, while adhering to a few basic rules. Examples of inappropriate clothing are:

- Shorts and skirts that are above mid-thigh length.
- Low cut, immodest, and revealing blouses, tank tops, and shirts.
- Any clothing that depicts or advertises drugs, alcohol, tobacco, sexual acts, profanity or that in any way demeans others (i.e., race, gender, sexual orientation). SKIN clothing that depicts the silhouette of a naked woman is an example of clothing that demeans a gender.

NEWS FROM THE CAFETERIA

If they have not done so, students must apply for free or reduced lunch status in order to receive that help with purchasing breakfast and lunch. Until the Free and Reduced applications have been turned in and cleared by food service, students must pay for their lunches. Please feel free to call Peggy at Food Service to check on the status of an application—476-4183.

If a student is receiving a reduced fee for lunch, they can eat breakfast at **no** charge.

Regular costs for meals this year:

Breakfast Prices—\$1.10 Lunch—\$2.35

Milk—\$.50 Reduced Lunch—\$.40

Students who pay for lunch at either the regular cost or the reduced cost are encouraged to pay a week or month at a time when possible.

We cannot charge lunches for students or staff, but students who are unable to pay will be given a sack lunch with a PB&J sandwich.

- Pajamas unless part of sanctioned school activity.
- Bathing suits, halter-tops, 'tube tops', backless and strapless tops.
- Clothing that reveals underwear including wearing low hanging or loose pants.
- Footwear not intended for outside use, i.e. slippers.
- Items that present a safety hazard cannot be worn, i.e., sunglasses inside the building.

When a student is not appropriately dressed for school, they will be reminded of the rules by staff members, asked to change clothing, and will receive a citation. Parents may be called and asked to bring a change of clothing. Students who continue to fail to respond to the rules will be given consequences, up to and including suspension.

STUDENT PLANNERS

All students have been issued a student planner / handbook at no charge. There are expectations

that each teacher is requiring each student to use the planners on a daily basis. The school rules and expectations are in the front of it. Ask to see your student's planner. Check to see that they are writing assignments and due dates in it.



Also, it is important that parents read through the handbook so they can be fully aware of the high school systems and expectations.

In order for students to get a hall pass from a class, the student must have the planner with him/her. This helps with safety, where in the case of an emergency, the teacher will know who has left the classroom. Additionally, the planner can be a place for the teacher and parents to communicate with each other about the student's progress.

If a student loses their planner, they will be required to replace it for a \$2.00 fee. This is less than the purchase price, so we are hopeful that students will keep track of their planners.



All profits raised through the sale of the ducks is currently going to the four high schools in the county to improve athletic facilities. Depending on the amount of money made, the Rotary matches the funds that are raised by Booster Clubs. 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HEALTHY KIDS—HEALTHY SCHOOLS

Three Rivers School District is joining with the Josephine County Health Department and other neighboring school districts in launching **Healthy Kids – Healthy Schools** so that we can reduce the chances of getting sick and help limit the spread of germs.

By doing a few simple things, we can stop the spread of germs:

- Wash your hands often using soap and water.
- Cover your mouth and nose with tissue when coughing and sneezing. Throw used tissues into the trash and then wash your hands.
- Cough into your sleeves.
- Stay home if you are sick and stay away from others as much as possible.
- Keep children home if they are sick.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.



Spread the word. Tell family and friends about these simple measures.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention defines an influenza-like illness as having the following symptoms:



Fever of 100 degrees Fahrenheit or higher AND

ONE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- Cough
- Score Throat
- Headache
- Muscle ache



If your child shows flu-like symptoms while at school, he or she will be sent to the office for screening (symptom check and/or taking temperature). If the student meets the definition as described above, he/she must be excluded from school until symptom free. This means that your child will not be allowed back in school until 24 hours after the fever is gone (without the use of fever reducing medications). Additional information is posted on the Three Rivers School District website.

CELL FREE ZONE

Classrooms and hallways between classes are 'cell free zones'. Students may use their phones before school, at lunch, and after school. We are asking for parent's cooperation in this matter. Ringing or vibrating phones in class are extremely disruptive. If a cell phone is seen or heard in class or if a students is seen on the phone in the hallways between

classes, the teacher or staff person will take it from the student and send or take it to the office where it will be safely stored in the vault. On the first offense, students may pick up their phone at the end of the day. On the second offense, a parent will need to come and get it. Chronic offenders will not be allowed to have a cell phone at school. Please do not call your student during school hours. If there is an emergency, call the office and we will get your student immediately.

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Program at Illinois Valley High School To Help Homeless Students and Families

Dear Parents/Guardians,

I am Heather Merrill, the Family Advocate for Illinois Valley High School. The purpose of the Family Advocate is to help students overcome barriers to success. I will help students acquire jackets, clothes, school supplies, hygiene supplies, glasses, dental appointments, haircuts, etc. I will also advocate for students. Examples of this are: helping them get testing or counseling, acquiring birth certificates, arranging for extra tutoring and other related services.

In addition, there is a federal law called the **McKinney-Vento**, which gives additional assistance to students that meet the federal definition of "homeless". Examples of "homeless" under the federal definition include:

- Living in a home with no heat or running water
- Staying with friends or other relatives because they lack housing choices
- Fleeing a domestic violence situation
- Living in a car, van, bus, tent, or other non-permanent structure
- Living in one of the above situations may also entitle a student to:
 - →Transportation to their home school should homelessness require a move
 - →Immediate enrollment, even if there are issues with not having the appropriate en rollment forms.

Dear Parents/Guardians.

- whether the student is provided services by paraprofessionals, and if so, their qualifications.
