2. Upgraded Metasys Direct Digital Controls – Johnson Controls

Scott Ney shared that, over the past several years, the district has been upgrading the building automation system at Mill Creek Elementary, Geneva Middle School North, and Geneva Middle School South. This summer, we will be replacing the pneumatic HVAC controls at Geneva High School and Coultrap Educational Services Center. The Facilities Task Force saw this presentation on January 9 and thought it would be beneficial for the full Board to see this information and what a useful tool it is.

Steve Green and Ryan Ditchev from Johnson Controls presented an update on the upgraded Metasys Direct Digital Controls (DDC). This system operates the heating ventilation air conditioning (HVAC), which minimizes down time and failures. It allows Mr. Ney and his staff to have remote access, so that if there is a problem during off hours they can be addressed before they become catastrophic. We also like to focus on the improved energy efficiency and the improved air quality for the students. Every building has its own dashboard that indicates if everything is good or if there is a problem, and pinpoints the problem. With this remote access, you can make corrections without going into the building. There is an alarm page that indicates equipment failures, such as a fan or coil, and all units have CO2 sensors. There are about 100 air handlers in this district, and you can check all of them within a short amount of time without going to each building.

Board comments, questions, concerns: When there is a problem, who gets the alarm notification? (It goes to Mr. Ney and his staff.) What systems do you have in place to keep our system from being hacked? (You must be on the network with an account and you cannot be on a guest Wi-Fi to gain access. The Metasys also has its own username and password.) On the dashboard, if it indicates there is a problem in one of the buildings, does Mr. Ney have to go to the building? (No, he can usually see the problem remotely and address the issue.) Did you calculate going from the old system

to the new system the cost savings? (We did not, but we can look into this.) Do we have warranty and maintenance? (Yes, you have a two-year warranty and we have ongoing maintenance with the district contract now. The software is upgraded every three years on this system.) Is this an additional cost? (No.) Can you use this system as an overview to check temperatures in the buildings? (Yes, and we do check this daily. There is a cost savings in staff overtime since we do not have to go out to the buildings.) Do we have times where we have students or teachers complaining about certain areas that are not coming up on the system, or are things pretty accurate? (It has been pretty accurate.)

Jackie Forbes shared that are a couple of bills working their way through the committee structure.

One is HB 1375, that deals with a personal finance class for high school students. There are specific content areas they are looking at adding to this requirement. Another is HB 1124, which is related to dyslexia screenings and would provide screenings for all students K-2. Lastly, there is HB 1066 that references the Open Meetings Act. It states that if there is a physical quorum present, members could vote to allow another member to remotely participate in the meeting if they are having an issue with childcare obligations.

5. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (Policy 3:40)

The Superintendent shared that the next two board meetings will be held at Geneva Middle School North, because we are between seasons, and we do have a lot to celebrate. The accomplishments of our students are many at this time. He thanked Todd Latham and his staff for their hard work, as they are working on the Meritorious Budget Award application. We are wrapping up evaluations that are due March 1 for our certified staff.
