Bridging the Gap




5th Grade Visits

Leaders identify students sitting alone and join them, ensuring everyone feels included.



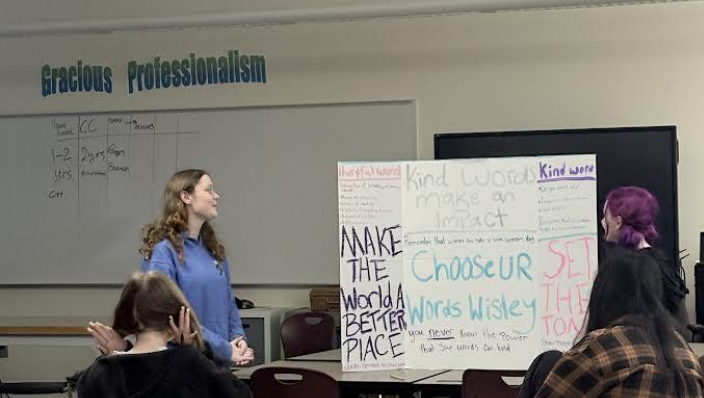
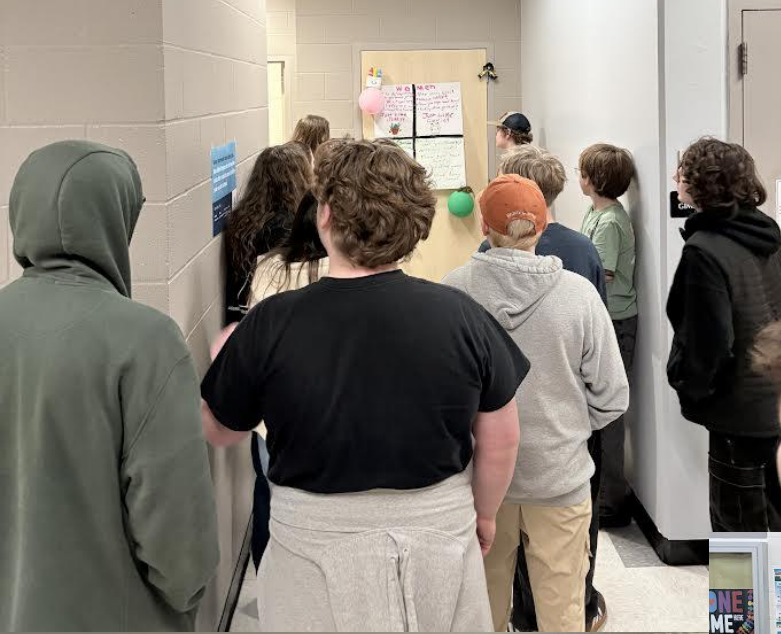
Mentorship
