# May 2005 Reports from Principals & Directors

## Board Report May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2005 Programs Director

The district was represented by 21 of our students in Portland on April 29<sup>th</sup> for the annual state writing contest. The students were selected by the Talented and Gifted teachers in each school building. All students were given a certificate of participation for their efforts. It is important that we recognize academics in our district. A special thanks for teachers Jannie Allen, Anna Browne, Kresimir Waite and parent volunteer Patrice Rouska for going to Portland to chaperone the event.

On April 21<sup>st</sup> we were given another chance to celebrate academics through the district sponsored math contest. This year the contest was held at Heppner Elementary School and was hosted by Jannie Allen. Almost 100 students participated through a challenging math test that lasted for 90 minutes. After the contest, awards were given in the new gym. 1<sup>st</sup> place winners will be awarded engraved plaques. The event lasted a little longer than planned because the test was difficult, but our students did very well.

We will be given another chance to celebrate academics on May 16<sup>th</sup>. The Morrow/Umatilla spelling contest will be held on Monday, May 16<sup>th</sup>. It will begin at 7:00 at the Blue Mountain Community College Theater. Plaques will be awarded to winners in each division from Morrow County. After this contest, winners will be participating in the State Spelling Contest that will be held on September 3<sup>rd</sup> during the state fair in Salem. All of these activities are helping our district meet the school board's goal of providing programs that enhance and develop the talents and individual needs of students.

I am still in the process of completing a required plan of reflection for our special education program. There are specific guidelines we need to follow. If there are areas that need improvement, we will write our plan and then submit it to the state.

The special education directors in the area are meeting on the 16<sup>th</sup> at the ESD. We hope to finalize the program we will be using to track our special education students next year.

Over 40 staff members gave up free time to attend a workshop at Riverside High School on April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Dr. Mickey Garrison spoke to staff members about students that are difficult to handle at school. Ideas were presented to increase positive attitudes in the school and those that attended often broke down into small groups to "solve" student problems or difficult situations in a school setting. I am attempting to schedule another training with Dr. Garrison in the fall. Thank You,

### Joel Chavez, ELL Director's Report to: Morrow County School District Board

May 9, 2005

The month of April has been one of ELL LAS testing, getting the 2005-06 ESL budgets and helping the flow of the ESL programs continue as planned.

This month in April all the ESL site coordinators and their assistants have been testing our 700 ESL students through out the district. By the second week of May I will be sending this data to the Oregon Department of Education for next years weighted ESL funding. Our goal is to have every child accounted for whom we served under the ESL district program and to have all our information complete and accounted for.

In special communications with the district we have made two Community Focus Group meetings at Riverside High School and Irrigon High School and Irrigon Elementary School. We met with parents and patrons and the superintendent and I met with parents on casual conversation about concerns and issues. Both Hispanic and Anglo parents came. At Irrigon we had very good conversations about concerns that we satisfying to our constituency.

According to our ELL District Plan, we set out to recruit the best teachers possible for our open teaching positions. At Spokane we met aspiring teachers and counselors with excellent credentials and Spanish abilities. We have still yet to determine how that day's work will result in the end with good teachers hired to instruct our students.

State reports about the AMAO's Annual Measurable Achievement Objectives and our achievement of ELL students in our district report cards are still a concern to all of our administration. As we received our AMAO report from the state about the achievement of the district's ELL students in Language Arts and Math, we have concern about the three criterions for passing each section.

For the first criterion no data was available for comment at this time.

For the second criterion, we did not meet the standard because we did not have enough of a percentage of students exiting the ESL program last year. Due to my error we exited the students two weeks after the date they were counted by the state. That means this year we will get the date of exiting right, and we will also count last year's 8% that we exited last year for this year. We should then have about 15 to 20% of our ESL students exiting plus last year's 8% too.

For the third criterion, we did not meet because a major percentage of our ELL students did not pass the AYP in English Language Arts. They passed the AYP Math, and they passed the Participation AYP in Language Arts, and they passed the Participation Math, but if they don't pass one they are determined as NOT MET. This is reason that they are ESL. It is because their goal is to acquire English, and in the near future no longer being considered as ESL.
