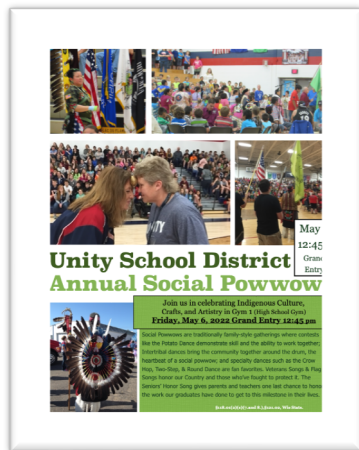

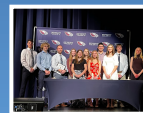

Advanced Placement, Early College Credit, and Start College Now

At Unity High School, students at all levels have amazing opportunities to pursue rigorous coursework resulting in college credits. For example, students can take Advanced Placement courses in all content areas that provide them with an opportunity to take a test at the culmination of the course. Students that test well and score a 3, 4, or 5 on those

exams generally receive equivalent college credits depending on the university or college. Students interested in attending a 4-year college can take up to 18 college credits free of charge through the ECCP program. Last but not least, students interested in technical colleges can also take up to 18 credits free of charge through the Start College Now program!
