Tillamook County Emergency Communications Bond, Paul Fournier

Oral Communication Public Input

Mr. Fournier, County Commissioner Elect introduced himself. A video was shared showing the current emergency communications system that was last updated twenty years ago. An upgraded system would reduce calls being redirected through multiple repeaters. The cost of the emergency communications bond is thirty-three cents per thousand dollars.

Mr. Fournier shared his past work experience within Tillamook County. The old system does not always get communications through to the needed first responders. They are dealing with antiquated equipment and towers that need replaced. This does not affect cell phone calls, just first responder radios.

Mr. Wantland asked if fire fighters could use satellite systems. Mr. Fournier explained that satellite systems are not reliable due to line-of-sight issues within forests. He shared the initial high cost of this bond has to do with replacing every single radio system for each responder. The new system is completely digital. It would be about \$95 per year for a \$300,000 home.

Ms. Aeder asked if any of the buses would be able to use the radio system. Mr. Fournier said he did not know about that.

Mr. Carr shared that he is a volunteer firefighter in Bay City, and if there is a huge disaster, we will want a system like this.

Dr. Schultz reminded everyone that if you watched what happened in North Carolina you can see the need for this.

Ms. Scalabrin asked if there will be more towers constructed. Mr. Fournier shared they will be upgrading the eleven tower sites with new equipment, while keeping future upgrades in mind. It could take up to five years to have all the towers fully upgraded.

Division 22 State Standards, Dr. Reed

Dr. Reed shared the annual report that will be submitted to the state after presentation to the board and the community. The district is in compliance with the Division 22 State Standards for the 2023-2024 school year. He shared the waivers around essential skills graduation requirement. New this year is the Menstrual Dignity Act, which is actually in law now. Last year we were compliant and we are compliant again this year. Another new requirement is social emotional learning for all staff in the district. We have new graduation requirements; students must have an additional .5 credits in Personal Finance and .5 credit in Higher Education and Career Path Skills. Certain diploma name types have been updated. For next year a substance use and prevention plan is required, this will be addressed in our health curriculum.

Ms. Bayouth-Real asked if the new social emotional requirement is for staff or does it include teaching this to students as well? Dr. Reed shared it is both and for the entire district.

Mr. Carr asked if the new social emotional standard will change what is currently already in place in buildings. Dr. Reed said the new standards will build on what is being used and improve upon it.

the number one school district in the state but has not hit 100 percent. He ranked our district against other districts in the state, our 5th and 6th grade students were 6th in the state. Overall Neah-Kah-Nie is rated 13th in the state. Since this data has been given to all school districts, other districts have contacted us and want to come and see what we are doing. Overall math comparisons were not quite so good, but is still good. There will be a new elementary math curriculum adopted this year.

Dr. Schultz wanted to know if we have a plan in place to train teachers to improve our math scores. Dr. Reed stated that we are adopting a new elementary curriculum and learning what works the best for our staff and students.

Mr. Wantland felt that with literacy scores going higher, that is going to improve all other scores. Dr. Reed stated all of the credit goes to the entire staff.

Ms. Norris-Rivera shared that 11th grade math is our lowest score. This may be because while math credits are required to graduate, Algebra 2 is not required and OSAS tests primarily on Algebra 2. Dr. Reed explained that at the high school level, the trimester grading system is not always beneficial in relation to the state test scheduling.

Neah-Kah-Nie School District Long Range Facility Planning, Workshop #1

The Facilities assessment is for board members to review. It addresses how much it would cost to bring a school up to code. It also addresses what we need to do immediately and looks at planned improvements.

Ms. Scalabrin asked if we have enough in our capital improvement plan compared against the facility assessment. Dr. Reed explained that the capital improvement plan does not have enough funds set aside for all that the assessment requires.

Mr. Carr felt some of the suggested improvement plans were conservative and others were overspending.

Dr. Reed stated that this is National School Lunch week. He encouraged the board to visit the cafeterias.

He met with Suzanne Bonamici last Wednesday and toured the high school. She met with those in student government to hear their thoughts. She looked at the Health Center, Construction Trades program and the Future Natural Resource Leaders (FNRL) course.

Mr. Carr felt this has been a very positive meeting and he likes what we are doing. Our sister district is going through a lot. The special education and cognitive learning abilities are more than some of our staff are trained for.

Ms. Aeder thanked Kathryn for bringing the Robotics team as well as the information that Ansel shared. We have had three members resign from the Inclusion Alliance committee. Christy Hartford will replace Ryan. Liwaru from NWRESD is having some time conflicts. Kathy Kammerer is also stepping down. Prospective replacements are being reviewed.

Mr. Wantland thanked Yukon for being here. He loves our new strategic plan. He is a firm believer that as the reading scores improve, so will other scores. Getting into the schools is important and he is proud to be a part of this district.

Dr. Schultz thanked Mark and Kari for taking him through the budget. He loves seeing what the values are in the school district. The strategic plan also shows the values of the district. He looks forward to getting out and visiting the schools and meeting the teachers and students.

Ms. Bayouth-Real shared she recently had a volunteer chaperoning opportunity. She was able to participate at an author visit at the Hoffman Center, with guest author Will Taylor, who wrote *The Language of Seabirds*. It was mostly 6th grade students who attended. Will put on a workshop on creative writing. She would have liked for us to have invited Will Taylor into our schools. She stated that we are seeing some people not invited into our schools. When our students see themselves represented in the people in front of them, they are more engaged in their school experience.

Ms. Tyrer appreciated everyone for their comments.




