## **AC Houghton Elementary**

Businesses that are participating in the program include: Select Market, Boardman Hardware, Macarios, Head Start and the county library.

## Sam Boardman Elementary School

October was a great month for Sam Boardman Elementary.

Our parent teacher organization had its first meeting this month. We were excited to triple our attendance from last year. The group is excited and committed to increasing parent involvement at SBE this year through a variety of means.

We held our first family reading night as well. 70 people came including 40 children. Carol Wilson read interactive stories to the group. Anne Orcutt played a game connected to the story and several teachers joined in. There was a puppet making station in the library, and students got to choose a free book before they left. Several families expressed thankfulness for the opportunity to attend the event.

The last week of October saw us celebrating Red Ribbon Week and providing an age appropriate dialogue around making healthy choices for our bodies and saying no to illegal drug use. Students made posters, decorated their classroom doors, participated in a special session on healthy choices, dressed up in different themes, and participated in an engaging end of the week assembly.

Several of our staff hosted and participated in a literacy workshop called Daily 5. Teachers enjoyed engaging in conversations around teaching and management strategy to facility more effective use of the curriculum and small group meetings. Feedback from the session was very positive. A number of teachers in the group have also started a Daily 5 group that meets regularly to continue the discussion around effective literacy practices.

Lynn Calvert, Darlene Jacobsen, and some assistants including Mary Lomas and Rosa Norwood hosted the first Ready for Kindergarten class. Parents of pre-school students come and learn what skills they can work on now in order to better prepare their child for kindergarten. #### **Windy River Elementary School**

The school district participated in an 8 hour in-service October 23rd. The focus of the training was to instruct teachers on how we can support students who have been mistreated. The presenter also shared ideas on how to create a unified school behavior plan. Windy River is working to create a system where behavior will be addressed as a school. In addition to a school behavior plan our site council is moving forward with our school improvement plan. This plan will gather information through parent, staff and student survey's. #### Management's Discussion and Analysis

## **Financial Report Talking Points:**

- Page 1. Revenue: According to August State School Fund Estimate we will be receiving about \$96M over the budgeted amount.
- Page 2. Expenditures: Buildings budgets are all still in good shape and that includes all purchases and encumbrances to date. All salaries and benefits have been encumbered for the entire year.
- Page 3. Special revenue funds recap to include month end balances.
- Page 4. General fund cash flow sheet, donations are showing over budget, but \$25M will be moved out to a special revenue fund.

## Maintenance, Facilities & Vehicles Update

Latest updates from the McKinstry HVAC work include the following:

<u>Phase I</u> - McKinstry and Clima-Tech have now been on site at Morrow County SD for the past two months performing the controls upgrades at all schools across the district. During this time, they have run into a few deficiencies which required their attention and they have been working to correct them. As a result, their schedule had to be adjusted slightly due to the added time required for that work.

They are working diligently to complete this work in a successful and quality manner and the important thing to note is that, during these upgrades the existing systems and operation have not been affected.

#### Phase II

- 1) HVAC Any front end and back end control issues addressed and a preventative maintenance/service contract will be further explored and assessed.
- 2) Light occupancy sensors energy efficiency study to determine potential savings?
- 3) Boiler tune-up/replacement (boiler assessment making sure any new boilers that we purchase and/or upgrade can be reused or retrofitted in other buildings).

## Phase III

- 1) Plumbing Depending on finances after Phase I & II work; we will need a study done to evaluate our plumbing infrastructures in the schools throughout the district?
- 2) Wiring/Electrical will also need a study done to evaluate our electrical service infrastructure throughout the district?
- 3) Roofing Determine scope and sequence of roofing related issues at several schools.
- 4) Security Upgrades are something we need to have on the table for consideration.

- \* Surplus sale was held district wide on October 16<sup>th</sup> with two more vehicles being sold including; the Ford Taurus #005 and The Chevy Astro Cargo Van #99-5.
- \* The Lexington building closing date has been extended to close on or before March 31<sup>st</sup>.
