Title of board policy being reviewed: JOA-Directory Information

The purpose of this policy is to define what qualifies as directory information in student records and to set rules for when and how MESD may release that information while protecting student privacy.

Mostly yes. The policy is clear in listing what counts as directory information, how notice is given, and how exclusions work, though some legal references and formal language may be difficult for general readers. We have the summary to help with this.



People

How are people affected positively or negatively by the policy? What potential barriers might people encounter? What barriers might be reduced by this policy?

Positive effects: Protects student privacy, gives families control over information release, ensures compliance with laws.

Negative effects: Families may miss deadlines or not understand opt-out rules, leading to unwanted release.

Potential barriers: Complex language, short 15-day response window.

Barriers reduced: Prevents misuse of sensitive data, blocks release of Social Security numbers and info for immigration enforcement.

This policy communicates a commitment to student privacy, legal compliance, family choice in information release, and safeguarding against misuse of personal data.

Place

What kind of positive or negative environment are we creating?

What are the barriers to more equitable outcomes? (e.g. mandated, political, emotional, financial, programmatic or managerial)

Environment: A generally positive environment of privacy protection and transparency, though with some risk of confusion or mistrust if families don't understand the process.

Barriers: Mandated legal requirements, complex language, and tight opt-out timelines may limit equitable access and understanding for some families.

Power

How is the power of decision-making shared with those it affects?

How have you intentionally involved the communities affected by this policy, program, practice, or decision?

Parents and eligible students can choose to opt out of directory information release.

Process
