It is with great pride that I can say we have succeeded in gaining a higher level of knowledge and understanding of the basic functioning components, as well as the basic maintenance of modern automobiles. This is a skill that will serve them well in the future and apply to a variety of applications, as well as provide the foundation for building on later.

The emphasis this year has been on mature and responsible practices, safety in the work place, and professionalism has shown. There is no doubt about the potential as well as the abilities of our students, and I know they will go far.


