<p>Josh Robinson Superintendent</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● The district is completing a 5 year pupil nondiscrimination self evaluation specifically reviewing our policies and procedures, enrollment trends in classes, participation trends in activities, scholarships, district efforts to achieve equality of educational opportunity and nondiscrimination, etc.. By May 30 we'll submit an assurances form to the DPI indicating the district has completed the process.● The Safe Routes to School Team has had a series of meetings this spring to revisit and revise the Safe Routes to School Plan originally created in 2015. With the help of the West Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, the updated plan outlines efforts that can be taken over the coming years to increase participation in walking and biking to school. WCWRRRC will continue to help implement the plan in the coming years.● May 6-12 was Teacher Appreciation Week. We celebrated our entire staff throughout the week with delicious food, coffee, a staff t-shirt, and a gift to a local business. <p>Megan Challoner Elementary Principal</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● Family Engagement events this past month have included Opera for the Young, 4/5 Spring Musical and Band Concert, K-5 Track and Field, and Bike Rodeo.<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Opera for the Young provided a fantastic opportunity for our families to attend and watch some of our students perform alongside Opera professionals in Beauty and the Beast.○ Our spring play, titled "Summer Camp," focused on campers at Camp Run-a-mock. The students performed small and large group ensembles, with some students also having solo parts. The play was enjoyable, featuring catchy songs that engaged the students.○ Thankfully, the weather cooperated for our Track and Field Day. Our students participated in throwing, jumping, and running events in front of their families and other supporters.○ For our 5th Annual Bike Rodeo, we partnered with the Safe Routes to School Program to provide top-of-the-line helmets for our students who needed a properly fitting helmet. Over 95 bikes were checked out for general maintenance by a Village Employee, and all students received instruction on bike and road safety from our school resource officer and Police Chief Tamara Larson.● As the end of the year approaches, teachers are finalizing their Educator Effectiveness evaluations. They are reflecting on student feedback from surveys, comparing student learning data, and analyzing their own professional growth and goals. Teachers in their summative year undergo a more formalized process with Ms. Challoner focusing on 6 main components. In an effort to continue fostering an environment focused on collective teacher efficacy, each team member presents a celebration highlighting either their SLO/PPG or other notable student accomplishments.● At noon on the last day of the May reading challenge, we soared past our goal and landed at 304,834 minutes of student and staff reading logged since September! Students alone have read a grand total of over 180.5 days of time logged throughout this school year. We have 423 challenge completions so far (and there will be more turned in next week when they finish them up tonight).

First, Reggie Dabbs from Youth Alive was brought to our district by the Youth of Burnett County Prevention Coalition for free. Reggie is one of the most sought-after speakers in the nation, speaking to students for over thirty years. He used comedy and powerful storytelling to fill the gym with laughter and hope. His main message highlights the power of resilience and the value of making healthy choices. The second speaker was Billy Molls, who is a big game guide in Alaska. Billy grew up on a dairy farm near Turtle Lake and always dreamed of being a hunting guide. Billy talked with our students about pursuing their dreams and persevering through the obstacles. • The Evening of Excellence was held on May 13th in the Performance Gym. The Frederic Scholarship Foundation, The Frandsen Foundation, other area organizations, businesses and universities awarded our graduating seniors with scholarships and awards. Twenty-two graduating seniors are taking advantage of the Frandsen Scholarship. Sixty-four scholarships were awarded throughout the night for a total of \$107,450. We had a great turn out for the event. Dawn Owens and Emily Stauty worked tirelessly to make it a memorable event for our seniors and their families. • Graduation happened on May 17th and was held in the main gym. The estimated number of attendees was over 600 people. We had 39 graduates this year, and 38 of them participated in the ceremony. Senior Julia Fredricks was the Mistress of Ceremonies and did a wonderful job leading the event. Kendal Lillehaug, the Salutatorian, and Abriannah Chenal, the Valedictorian, reminisced about the past and projected to the future with words of encouragement to their classmates.
