# STUDENT WELFARE WELLNESS AND HEALTH SERVICES

FFA (LOCAL)

### **WELLNESS**

The District shall follow nutrition guidelines that advance student health and reduce childhood obesity and shall promote the general wellness of all students through nutrition education, physical activity, and other school-based activities.

## DEVELOPMENT OF GUIDELINES AND GOALS

The District shall develop nutrition guidelines and wellness goals in consultation with the local school health advisory council and with involvement from representatives of the student body, school food service, school administration, the Board, parents, and the public. [SeeBDFandEHAA]

## NUTRITION GUIDELINES

The District shall ensure that nutrition guidelines for reimbursable school meals shall be at least as restrictive as federal regulations and guidance and that all foods available on each campus are in accordance with the USDA Federal Guidelines for Smart Snacks and competitive foods. [See CO]

In addition to legal requirements, the District shall:

- Establish age-appropriate guidelines for food and beverages at classroom parties or school celebrations [see CO];
- 2. Establish guidelines for school-sponsored fund-raising activities that involve serving or selling food;
- 3. Prohibit the sale of food items or beverages for personal gain by anyone on school grounds during school hours. Permission will be required from the principal for sates after school hours.

The District shall implement, in accordance with law, a coordinated health program with a nutrition education component [see EHAB and EHAC] and shall use health course curriculum that emphasizes the importance of proper nutrition [see EHAA].

In addition, the District establishes the following goals for nutrition education:

# WELLNESS GOALS NUTRITION EDUCATION

1. The food service staff, teachers, and other school personnel will coordinate the promotion of nutrition messages in the cafeteria, the classroom, and other appropriate settings.

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2. Educational nutrition information will be shared with families and the general public to positively influence the health of students and community members.

## PHYSICALACTIVITY

The District shall implement, in accordance with law, a coordinated health program with physical education and physical activity components and shall offer at least the required amount of physical activity for all grades [see EHAB and EH AC].

In addition, the District establishes the following goals for physical activity:

- 1. The District will provide an environment that fosters safe and enjoyable fitness activities for all students, including those who are not participating in competitive sports.
- 2. Physical education classes will regularly emphasize moderate to vigorous activity.
- 3. The District will encourage teachers to integrate physical activity into the academic curriculum whereappropriate.
- 4. Teachers and other school staff will receive training to promote enjoyable, life-long physical activity for themselves and students.
- 5. The District will encourage parents to support their children's participation, to be active role models, and to include physical activity in family events.

# SCHOOL-BASED ACTIVITIES

The District establishes the following goals to create an environment conducive to healthful eating and physical activity and to express a consistent wellness message through other school-based activities:

- 1. Sufficient time will be allowed for students to eat meals in lunchroom facilities that are clean, safe, and comfortable.
- 2. Wellness for students and their families will be promoted at suitable school activities.
- 3. Employee wellness education and involvement will be promoted at suitable school activities.

## **IMPLEMENTATION**

The health/physical education coordinator shall oversee the implementation of this policy and shall develop administrative procedures for periodically measuring the implementation of the wellness policy.

## **Smart Snacks in School**

## **USDA's "All Foods Sold in Schools" Standards**

USDA has established practical, science-based nutrition standards for snack foods and beverages sold to children at school during the school day. The standards allow schools to offer healthier snack foods to children, while limiting junk food.

The health of today's school environment continues to improve. Students across the country are now offered healthier school lunches with more fruits, vegetables and whole grains. The *Smart Snacks in School* standards build on those healthy advancements and ensure that kids are only offered tasty and nutritious foods during the school day.

*Smart Snacks in School* also supports efforts by school food service staff, school administrators, teachers, parents and the school community, all working hard to instill healthy habits in students.

## **Nutrition Standards for Foods**


- Any food sold in schools must:
  - Be a "whole grain-rich" grain product; or
  - Have as the first ingredient a fruit, a vegetable, a dairy product, or a protein food; or
  - Be a combination food that contains at least ¼ cup of fruit and/or vegetable; or
- Foods must also meet several nutrient requirements:
  - · Calorie limits:

Snack items: ≤ 200 calories
 Entrée items: ≤ 350 calories

· Sodium limits:

 $\circ$  Snack items: ≤ 200 mg Entrée items: ≤ 480 mg

- Fat limits:
  - Total fat: ≤35% of calories
  - Saturated fat: < 10% of calories</li>
  - Trans fat: zero grams
- Sugar limit:
  - $\circ$   $\leq$  35% of weight from total sugars in foods



## **Nutrition Standards for Beverages**

## All schools may sell:

- Plain water (with or without carbonation)
- Unflavored low fat milk
- Unflavored or flavored fat free milk and milk alternatives permitted by NSLP/SBP
- · 100% fruit or vegetable juice and
- 100% fruit or vegetable juice diluted with water (with or without carbonation), and no added sweeteners.
- Elementary schools may sell up to 8-ounce portions, while middle schools and high schools may sell up to 12-ounce portions
  of milk and juice. There is no portion size limit for plain water.
- Beyond this, the standards allow additional "no calorie" and "lower calorie" beverage options for high school students.
  - · No more than 20-ounce portions of
  - · Calorie-free, flavored water (with or without carbonation); and
  - Other flavored and/or carbonated beverages that are labeled to contain < 5 calories per 8 fluid ounces or ≤ 10 calories per 20 fluid ounces.
  - No more than 12-ounce portions of
  - Beverages with ≤ 40 calories per 8 fluid ounces, or ≤ 60 calories per 12 fluid ounces.

## **Other Requirements**

#### Fundraisers

- The sale of food items that meet nutrition requirements at fundraisers are not limited in any way under the standards.
- The standards do not apply during non-school hours, on weekends and at off-campus fundraising events.
- The standards provide a special exemption for infrequent fundraisers that do not meet the nutrition standards. State agencies determine the frequency with which fundraising activities take place that allow the sale of food and beverage items that do not meet the nutrition standards.

## Accompaniments

- Accompaniments such as cream cheese, salad dressing and butter must be included in the nutrient profile
  as part of the food item sold.
- This helps control the amount of calories, fat, sugar and sodium added to foods by accompaniments, which can be significant.
