RE: Tupelo Public School District Federal Programs

Attached for your review is a request for permission to provide communication to the Board of Trustees. The focus is to communicate to the board information for all of the Federal Programs served by the Director of Federal Programs.

The Consolidated Federal Program Application (CFPA) consists of Title I and Title II, which includes requirements for both English Language Learner and Homeless students. Please note the general information of each Federal Program for review:

- Title I, Part A Basic
 - This program provides financial assistance to help ensure that all children meet challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards
 - Schools enrolling 40% of students from poor families are eligible to use Title I funds for schoolwide programs that serve all children in the school
 - Title I Schools
 - Carver Elementary: Students Served 450
 - Early Childhood Education Center: Students Served 240
 - Joyner Elementary: Students Served 396
 - Parkway Elementary: Students Served 468

- Thomas Elementary: Students Served 452
 - Total Students Served 2006
- Allocation FY 12 \$ 1,798,325
- Period of Availability July 1, 2011 December 31, 2013
- Title I, Part C-Migrant
 - The purpose of the Migrant Education Program is to ensure that children of migrant workers have access to and benefit from the free, appropriate public education, provided to other children
 - A migratory child is a child who is, or whose parent, spouse, or guardian is, a migratory agricultural worker or migrant fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, has moved from one school district to another, to obtain or accompany such parent, spouse or guardian, in order to obtain temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work as a principal means of livelihood.
 - Allocation: Funded by Mississippi Migrant Service
 Center
- Title I, Neglected and Delinquent (N/D)
 - The N/D Program under Part D consists of 2 subparts, both discretionary. Subpart 1 is the State Agency Neglected and Delinquent formula grant program; Subpart 2 is the Local Educational Agency program.
 - Funding is based on the October Count
 - The LEA program required to reserve, from its Title I allocation, funds generated by the number of children in locally operated institutions for neglected youth.
 - Locally Operated Institutions
 - ALPHA House
 - Gardner/Simmons
 - Faith Haven
 - Tupelo Children's Mansion
 - Allocation FY12 \$ 51,168
 - Period of Availability July 1, 2011 December 31, 2013

- The State Agency N/D program provides formula grants for supplementary education services to help provide education continuity for children and youth in state-run institutions for juveniles and in correctional institutions, so that these youth can make successful transitions to school or employment once they are released from state institutions.
 - Juvenile Detention Center
 - Allocation FY12 \$ 112,355
 - Period of Availability July 1, 2011 –
 December 31, 2013
- Title II, Part A-Highly Qualified Teachers and Administrators
 - The purpose of the Title II funding is to increase academic achievement by improving teacher and principal quality and the option to utilize the Class-Size Reduction initiative.
 - Allocation FY12 \$ 337,587
 - Period of Availability July 1, 2011 December
 31, 2013
- Title III, Part A-English Language Learners
 Number Limited English Served: 254 students
 Number Limited English Monitored Year 1: 42 students
 Number Limited English Monitored Year 2: 2 students
 Number Immigrant Students Served: 15 students
 - The purpose of the Title III program is to ensure that Limited English Proficient (LEP) children, including immigrant children and youth, master English and meet the same rigorous standards for academic achievement as all children are expected to meet, including meeting challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards by developing high-quality language instruction education programs.
 - Required Usage of Funds
 - Implementation of scientifically research based high-quality language instruction educational programs

- High-quality professional development of to classroom teachers and administrators to improve the instruction and assessment of LEP students
- Annually assess the English proficiency of all LEP students
 - Allocation FY12 \$ 67,114
 - Period of Availability July 1, 2011 –
 December 31, 2012
- Title IV, Part B-21st Century Learning Centers (CCLC)
 - The purpose of the Title IV, Part B, 21st CCLC is to provide opportunities for communities to establish or expand activities in community learning centers that
 - Provide academic enrichment opportunities students to meet state and local student standards in core academic subjects
 - Offer students enrichment activities that complement regular academic programs
 - Offer literacy and other educational services to families of participating children
 - Allocation FY12: Tupelo Middle School
 - Monitoring Responsibility: Office of Federal Programs
- Title X, Part C-McKinney-Vento Education for Homeless Children and Youth

This grant is awarded to LEA on a competitive and yearly basis Number Homeless Students Served: 449 students

- The purpose of Title X, is to provide activities for and services to, homeless children and youth including preschool-age children that enable these children and youth to enroll, attend and succeed in school.
 - Allocation: FY12 \$ 47,359.84
 - Period of Availability September 1, 2011 December 31, 2012
