3362.01 - THREATENING BEHAVIOR TOWARD STAFF MEMBERS

The Board of Education believes that a staff member should be able to work in an environment free of threatening speech or actions.

Threatening behavior consisting of any words or deeds that intimidate, or are intended to intimidate, a staff member or are reasonably likely to cause concern for his/her physical and/or psychological well-being is strictly forbidden. Such actions by any student, parent, visitor, staff member, Board member, contractor, or agent of the Board is prohibited, and the Board authorizes appropriate corrective and remedial action including disciplinary action where appropriate, referral to law enforcement, or pursuit of other remedies, including injunctive relief if appropriatewho is found to have threatened a member of the staff will be subject to discipline and reported to the appropriate law enforcement authorities. This policy should be read consistent with, and in conjunction with, school safety and the mandatory reporting of threats of violence in Policy 8462.01 - Threats of Violence.

Threatening behavior consisting of any words or deeds that intimidate a staff member or cause anxiety concerning his/her physical and/or psychological well being is strictly forbidden. Any student, parent, visitor, staff member, or agent of this Board who is found to have threatened a member of the staff will be subject to discipline and reported to the appropriate law enforcement authorities.

The District Administrator <u>may</u>shall <u>administer</u> implement guidelines <u>to implement procedures for complaints and for</u> investigation, as well as resolution of complaintswhereby whereby students and employees understand this policy and appropriate procedures are established for prompt and effective action on any reported incidents.
